Marquette University men's basketball players compete and train in two of the finest facilities in the nation - the AI McGuire Center and the Bradley Center.

The \$31-million AI McGuire Center features a 4,000-seat arena, practice gym, strength & conditioning area, sports medicine center, team offices, locker room and academic center. The newest addition is the Colorado Altitude Training Chamber, the only one of its kind in collegiate basketball. The chamber aids in the development of the strength of a player's lungs.



# The Bradley CENTER

The Bradley Center seats nearly 19,000 people and has developed into one of the top playing environments in the nation. Home of the NBA's Milwaukee Bucks, the arena is consistently near capacity for Marquette games, allowing the program to rank among the top 25 in attendance on an annual basis.

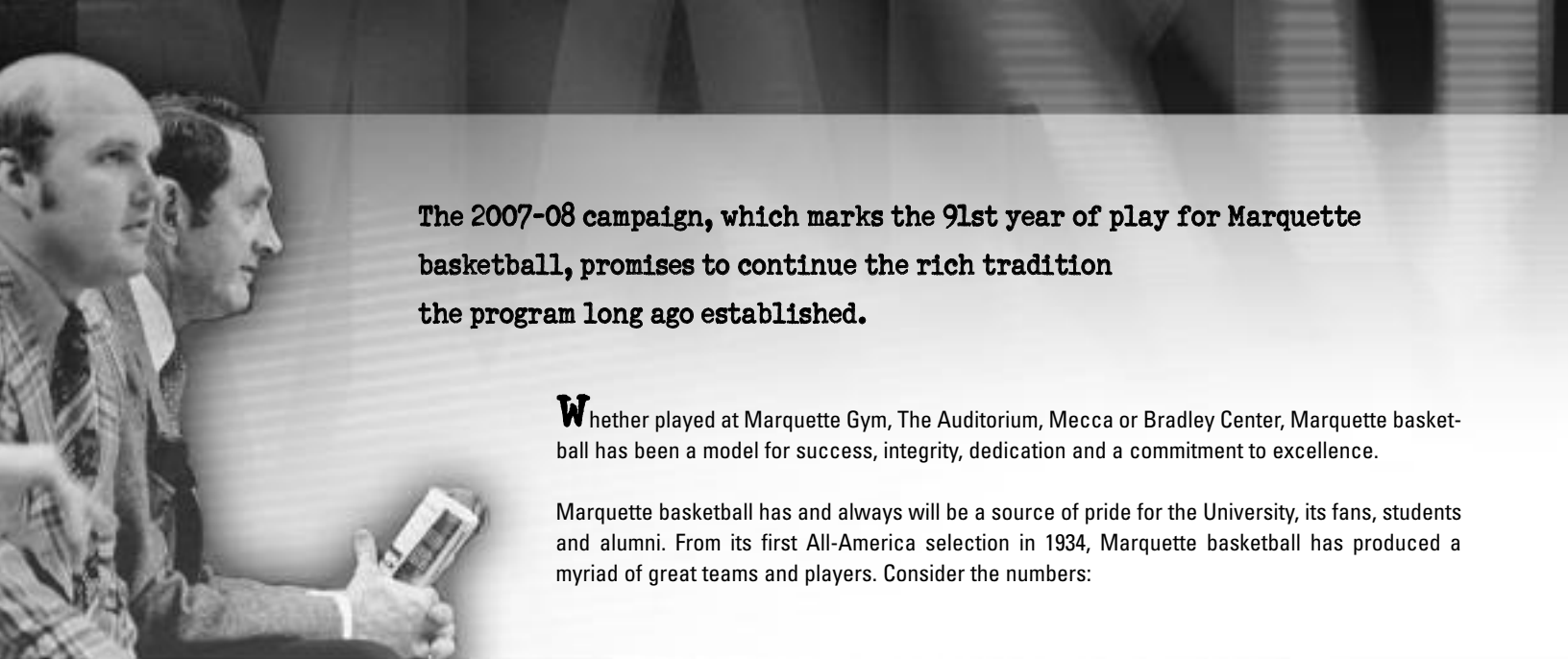

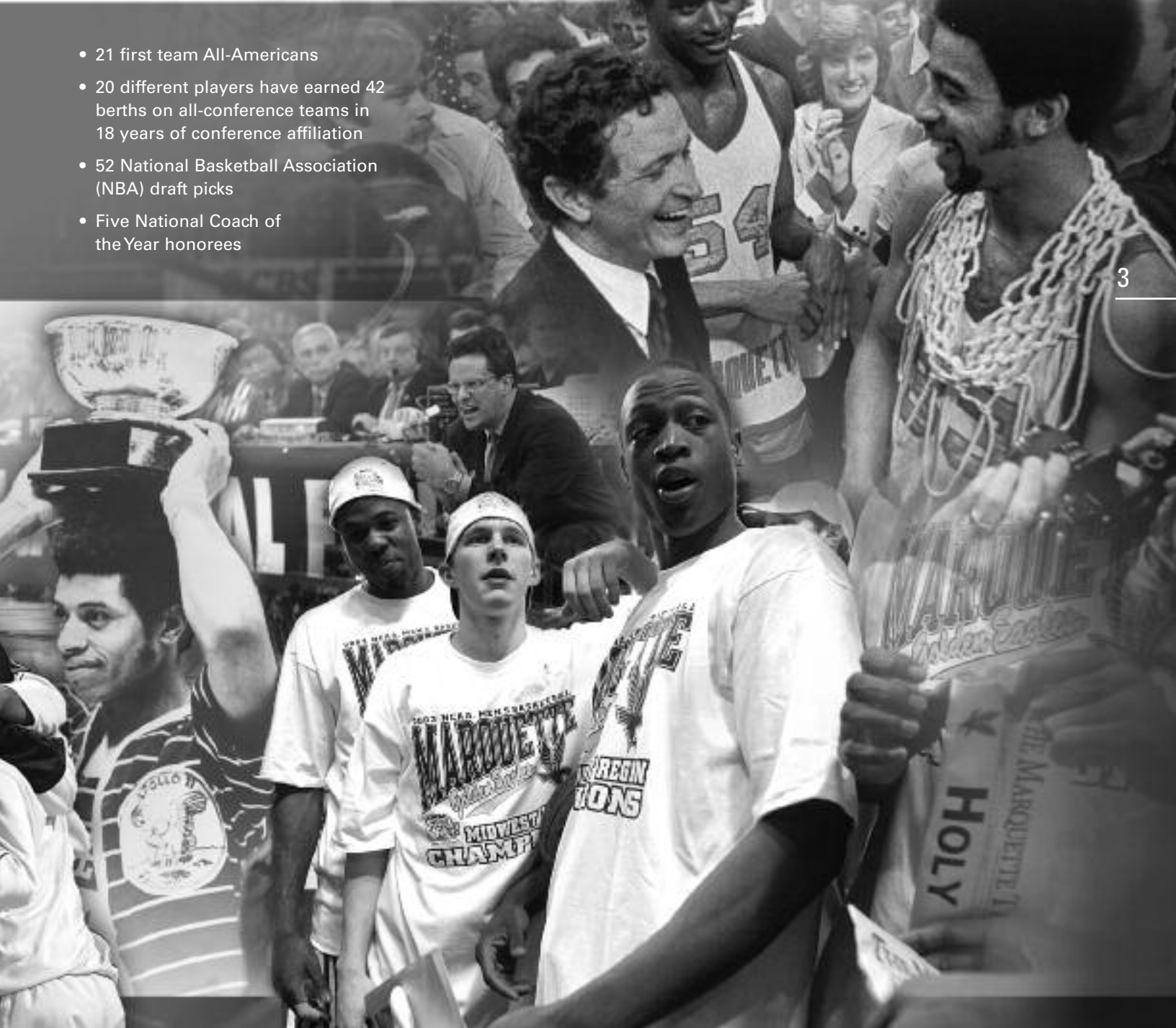

AL MCGUIRE CENTER

Opened in October 2003, the facility is named after the legendary basketball coach Al McGuire, who led the program to an NCAA championship, an NIT title and 295 victories in 13 seasons.

Through the generosity of alumni and friends, Marquette Basketball has been provided a facility that is unparalleled as they prepare for competition in the BIG EAST Conference.

The \$31 million practice and play facility features a 4,000 seat arena and full-size practice gym, strength and conditioning area, sports medicine and athletic training areas, coaches' offices, team locker room and lounge, and academic center.

The Al McGuire Center provides the best possible environment for the development of Marquette's student-athletes – academically, athletically and personally.

## Practice Gym

Marquette Basketball's private full-size practice gym is located on the lower level of the McGuire Center. The practice court is an exact replica of the team's court at the Bradley Center.

## Academic Center

The McGuire Academic Center offers comfort, space and the latest in computing technologies to support Marquette basketball players in achieving academic success. The facility features a completely wireless environment in which student-athletes can work at one of 20 computer stations, four individual tutoring rooms and an adjacent conference room.

## Strength & Conditioning/Sports Medicine Facilities

Marquette's state-of-the art 4,000 square-foot strength and conditioning facility, plus sports medicine suite that includes a three-pool hydrotherapy room, were designed to assist student athletes in reaching peak performance.

## Video/Film Editing & Screening Rooms

Utilizing the latest in video technology, Marquette basketball coaches and players gather to analyze film in the team's screening room. The room features a 140" screen, DVD, VHS and computer software capabilities, surround sound and theatre-style seating.

## Men's Basketball Offices, Player Lounge and Locker Room

The staff's offices, locker room and player lounge are all conveniently located within steps of the practice gym.

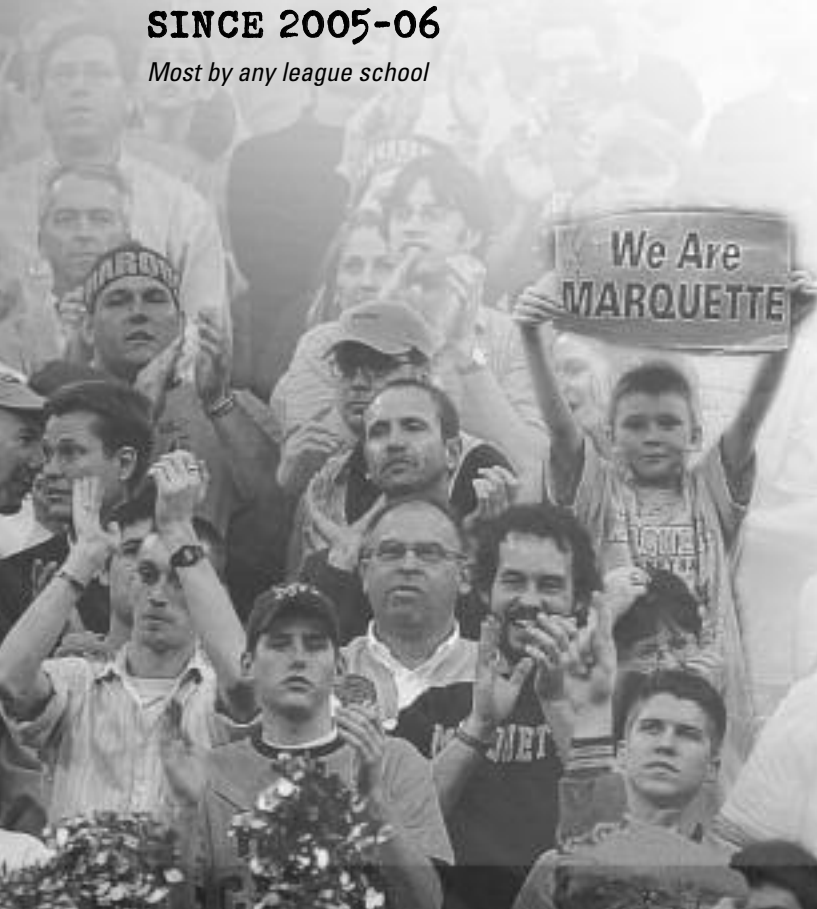

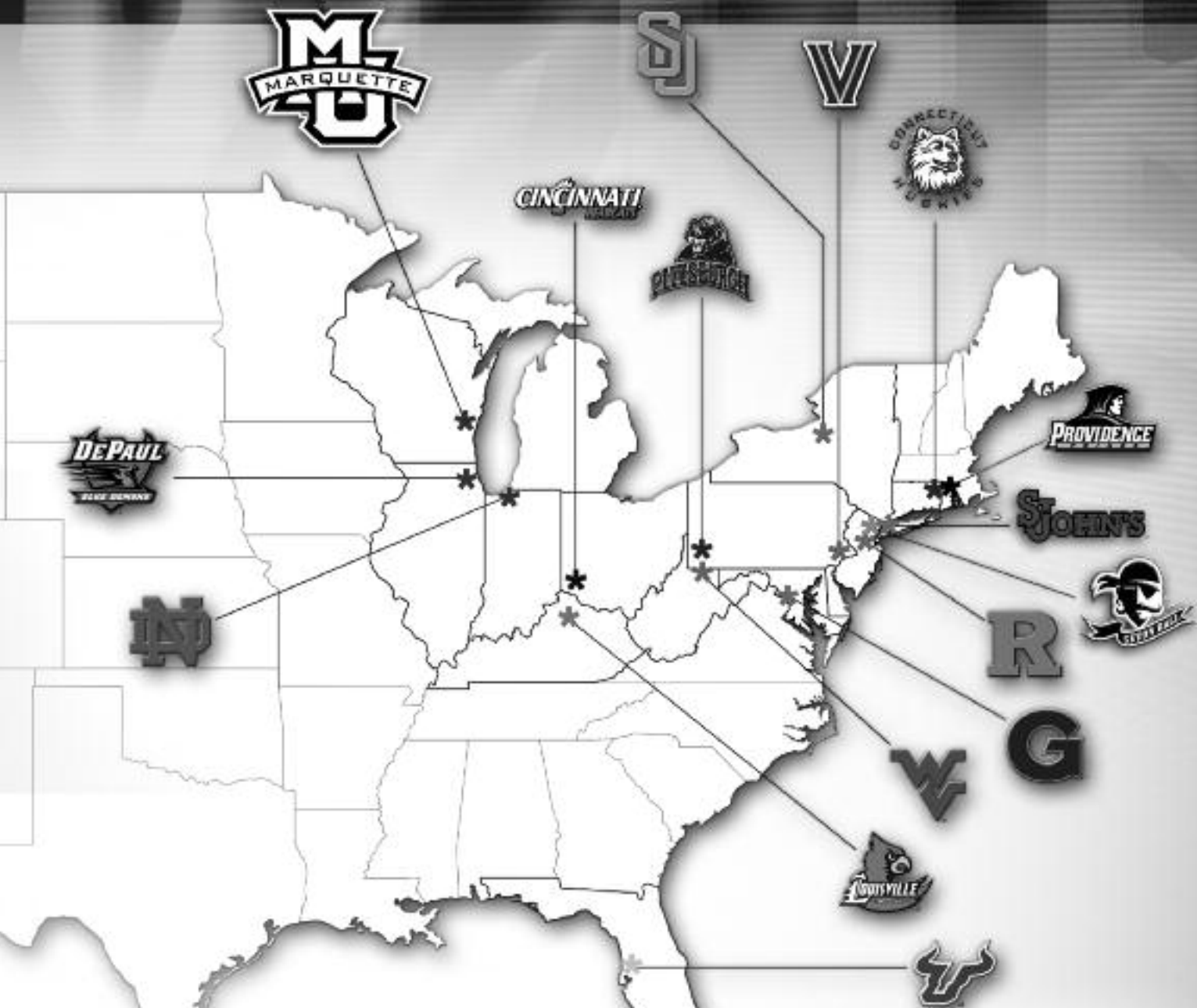

**M**arquette Basketball's Individual Instruction Program is designed to help a player show constant improvement in different areas of his game while helping to assure that he is staying ahead of the competition.

Through hard work, commitment, attention to detail, and competition, Marquette Basketball's Individual Instruction Program benefits the player as well as the team.





MU's continued team success in the BIG EAST Conference resulted in continued individual recognition. In 2007-08 sophomore Dominic James captured AP Honorable Mention All-America accolades and was also named to the First Team All-BIG EAST Team. Classmate Jerel McNeal claimed the league's top defensive player award.

In 2006, Steve Novak was one of four unanimous selections to the All-BIG EAST Conference first team and was selected in the second round of the NBA Draft by the Houston Rockets. Guards Dominic James and Jerel McNeal earned All-BIG EAST Rookie team honors, and James was named the league's rookie of the year.

In 2005, Travis Diener became Marquette's fourth consecutive All-Conference USA first team selection and was selected by the Orlando Magic in the 2005 NBA Draft.

In 2003, Dwyane Wade became Marquette's first Associated Press First Team All-America selection since 1978, while also capturing Conference USA Player of the Year honors. The year prior, Wade was a Conference-USA first team selection and an honorable mention AP All-American.

Along with Wade in 2003, Travis Diener and Robert Jackson both were selected to Conference USA's second team, and Steve Novak was picked to the Conference's All-Freshman Team as well as being chosen the league's Sixth Man of the Year.

Other beneficiaries of MU's Individual Instruction Program include Cordell Henry, a second team all-league honoree in 2001-02 and third-team member in 2000-01, and Brian Wardle, a two-time all-conference selection who became the first Marquette player to earn Conference USA first team honors (2000-01).

Overall, Tom Crean has developed 18 All-Conference selections in eight years at Marquette.

## Strength and Conditioning Philosophy at Marquette

Strength and conditioning is an integral part of the athletes' periodized year round training at Marquette University. The Student-Athlete Performance staff works closely with each coaching staff and sports medicine to develop a program appropriate for their sport, catering to the strengths and weaknesses of the individual athletes.

The goal of the athletic performance staff is to prepare the athletes for the physical and mental demands of their sport. Physically, an increase in strength improves durability, decreasing the risk of injury. Strength training focuses on the use of free weight multi-joint exercises. Olympic Weightlifting movements and plyometrics teach athletes explosiveness. Speed, quickness, and agility drills help to transfer the gained strength

and power to the athletic arena. In addition, just as athletics places mental demands on the athletes and teams, training focuses on the development of mental toughness and team cohesiveness. Athletes are taught to train through their comfort zone and work with their teammates to achieve optimal performance.

Conditioning workouts train for the metabolic demands of the sport through the manipulation of work intervals, rest intervals, movements and distances. Sport specific conditioning tests are performed throughout the year in order to monitor changes in fitness and speed, as well, as to motivate the athletes to perform at their highest level during each workout. The strength and conditioning programs are designed to

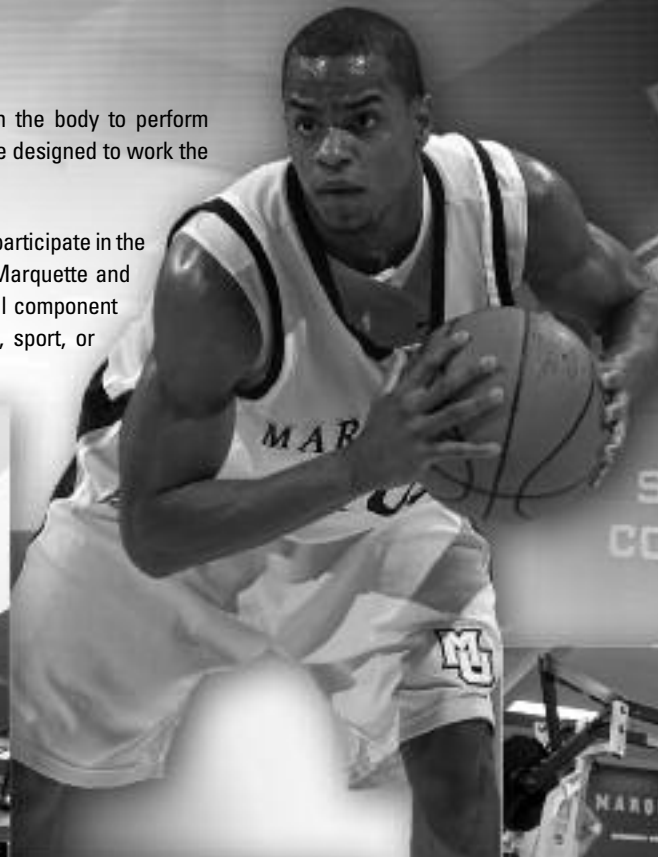

improve strength and durability, as well as teach the body to perform explosively in athletic movements. All workouts are designed to work the entire body, focusing on quality, not quantity.

The athletic performance department is excited to participate in the development of each of the athletes' careers at Marquette and feels that strength and conditioning is an essential component to the success of all athletes regardless of age, sport, or ability level.





**T**he Student-Athlete Performance component of Student-Athlete Support Services includes the areas of Academic Support, Sports Medicine and Strength & Conditioning. The staff members in these departments work together to provide services that maximize the opportunity for each student-athlete to prosper, academically and athletically.

Services are offered to ensure physical, mental, and emotional well-being and individual programs are developed for student-athletes that request or require specific attention to needs in the areas of health, nutrition, performance enhancement, time management and academic success.

Medical and performance enhancement services are provided to Marquette University's student-athletes year-round in two facilities, while academic support is provided year-round, seven-days-per-week in The Eagles Nest in the Al McGuire Center.

While the emphasis in the departments that constitute the Student-Athlete Performance component is on preparing each individual for success as a Marquette University student-athlete, it is also each department's goal to prepare the student-athlete for success following the completion of their academic degree(s) and athletic career.

### Did you know?

- That 50 of 52 Marquette players have graduated over the past 16 years
- The Marquette Basketball program won the C-USA Sport Academic Award (Highest GPA in the conference) three times
- Former Marquette player Bart Miller received the 1999-2000 C-USA Basketball Student-Athlete of the Year Award

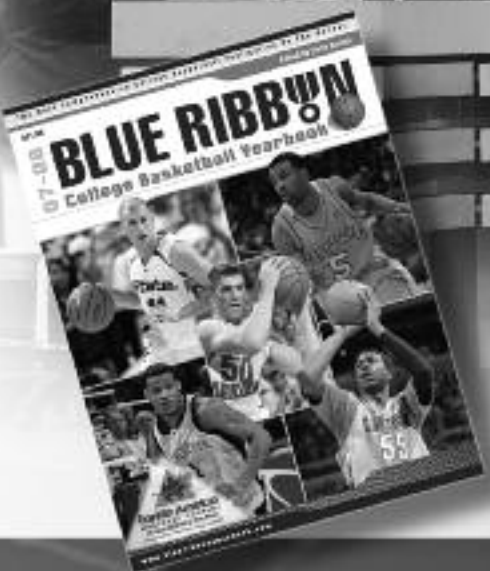

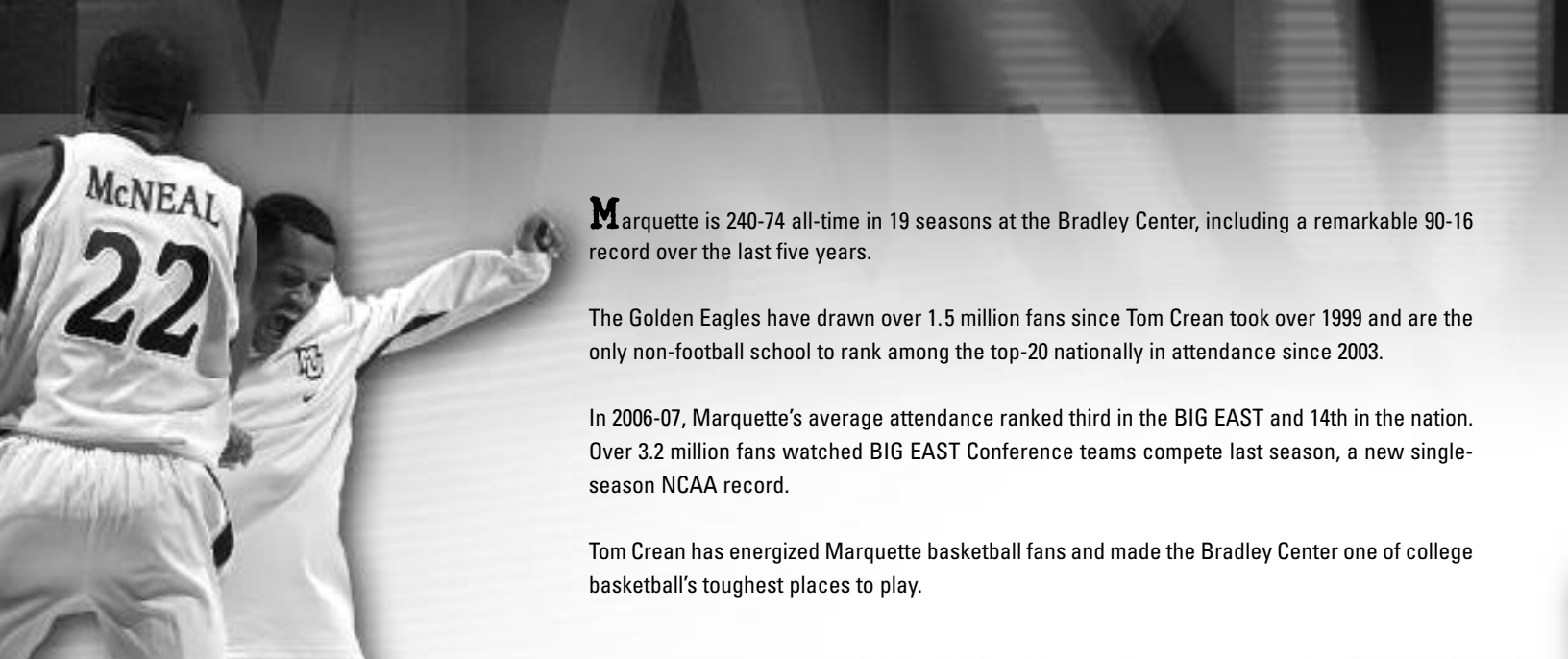
## Highlights of the new deal include:

- Every single intra-conference game will be televised.
- Minimum 60 games on ESPN or ESPN2
- 110 additional regular season games broadcast on the remaining ESPN platforms
- 80 games on ESPN Regional
- 30 conference games on ESPNU/ESPN360
- Minimum of 10 conference or non-conference games on CBS
- The above gives the BIG EAST a minimum grand total of 180 television games each year.









**M**arquette is 240-74 all-time in 19 seasons at the Bradley Center, including a remarkable 90-16 record over the last five years.

The Golden Eagles have drawn over 1.5 million fans since Tom Crean took over 1999 and are the only non-football school to rank among the top-20 nationally in attendance since 2003.

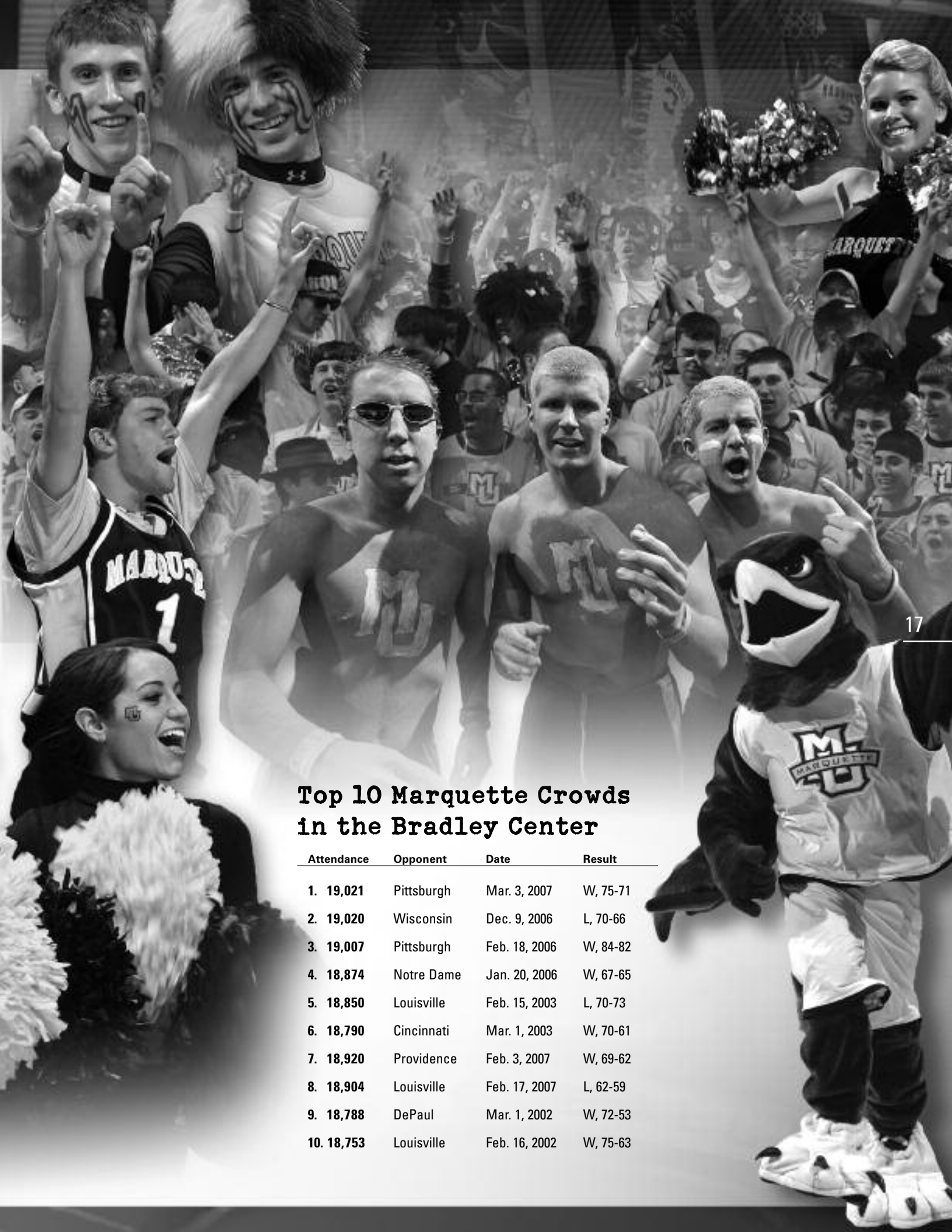

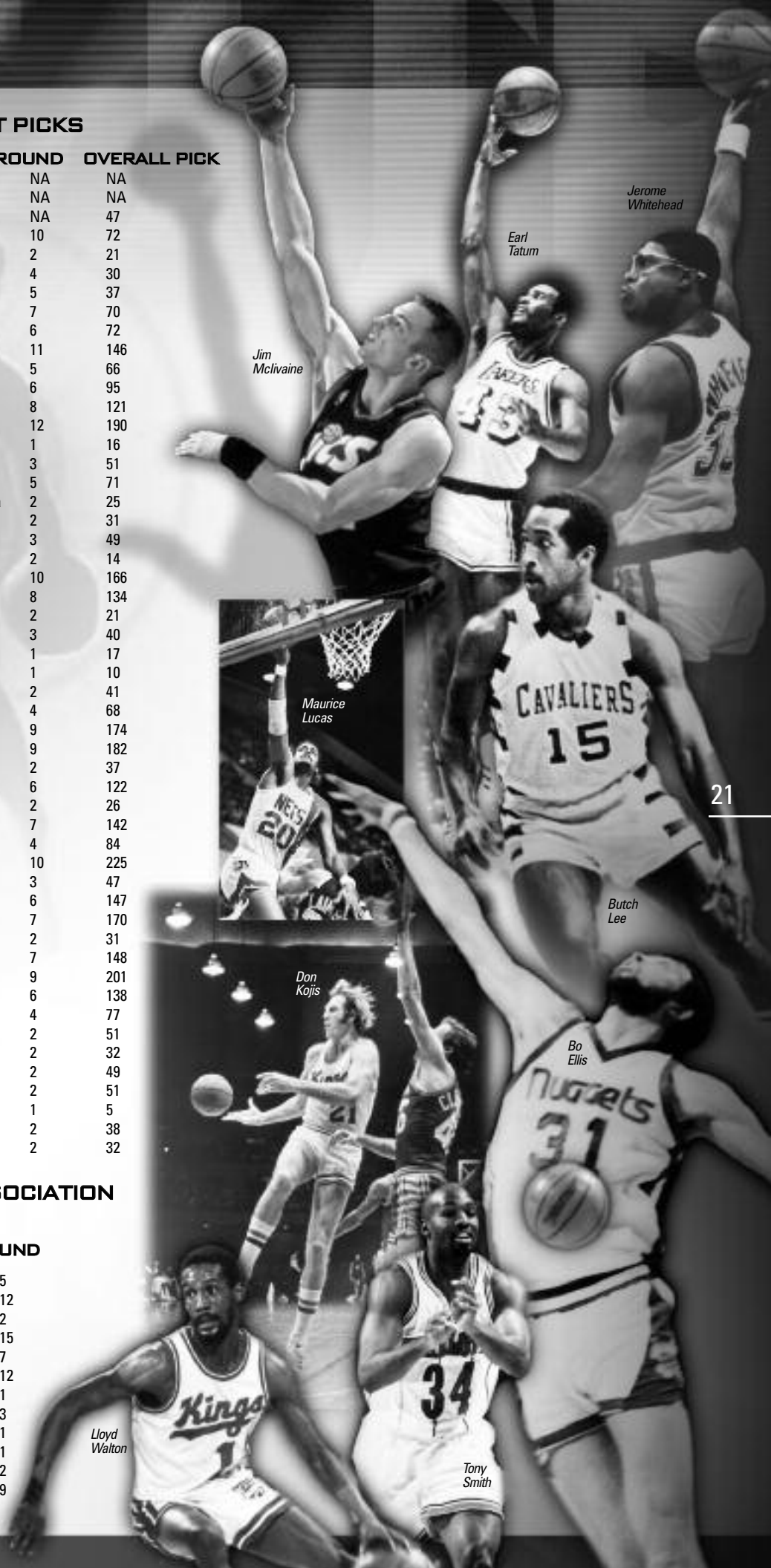



# DOC *and* DWYANE

*Glenn "Doc" Rivers & Dwyane Wade, both former Marquette basketball standouts, are two of the NBA's most respected figures.*

## Glenn "Doc" Rivers

An All-American at Marquette in 1982, Doc closed out his career with 1,234 points and still ranks prominently among the school's all-time leaders in points, assists and steals.

Following his college days, Rivers enjoyed a 13-year career in the NBA playing for the Atlanta Hawks, Los Angeles Clippers, New York Knicks and San Antonio Spurs. During the course of his career, he averaged 10.9 points, 5.7 assists and 3.0 rebounds. Rivers was selected to play in the 1988 NBA All-Star Game and was honored by the Pro Basketball Writers with the 1990 J. Walter Kennedy Citizenship Award.

Following his retirement in 1996, Rivers joined TNT as a basketball analyst and served in that capacity until June 1999, when he was named the head coach of the Orlando Magic. In four-plus seasons at the helm of the Magic, he directed the club to three playoff appearances and in 2000 was awarded the Red Auerbach Trophy as the NBA's Coach of the Year.

In 2004, Rivers joined Al Michaels on ABC Sports' number one broadcast team for the NBA. Rivers returned to the sideline when the NBA's most storied franchise, the Boston Celtics, named him their head coach.



## Dwyane Wade

One of the most decorated players in Marquette Basketball history, Dwyane Wade had a profound and successful impact during his three-year affiliation with the Golden Eagles' program. Wade helped lead Marquette to 53 victories, two NCAA appearances, the 2003 Final Four and the sixth best winning percentage in Division I in his two seasons of play.

Wade's unbelievable final season of play in 2002-03 resulted in a myriad of national recognition. He was named a first team Associated Press All-American, the school's first such selection since 1978, one of five finalists for the Wooden Award, and also garnered Conference USA's Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year awards.

Wade holds the school seasonal scoring record with 710 points and finished his career ranked among Marquette's all-time leaders in points, blocks and steals.

Wade has become one of the marquee superstars since being selected fifth overall by the Miami Heat in the 2003 NBA Draft. In just his third NBA season, Wade helped lead his team to a six-game victory over the Dallas Mavericks in the 2006 NBA Finals by averaging 34.7 points and 7.8 rebounds. His record-breaking finals performance earned him MVP honors.

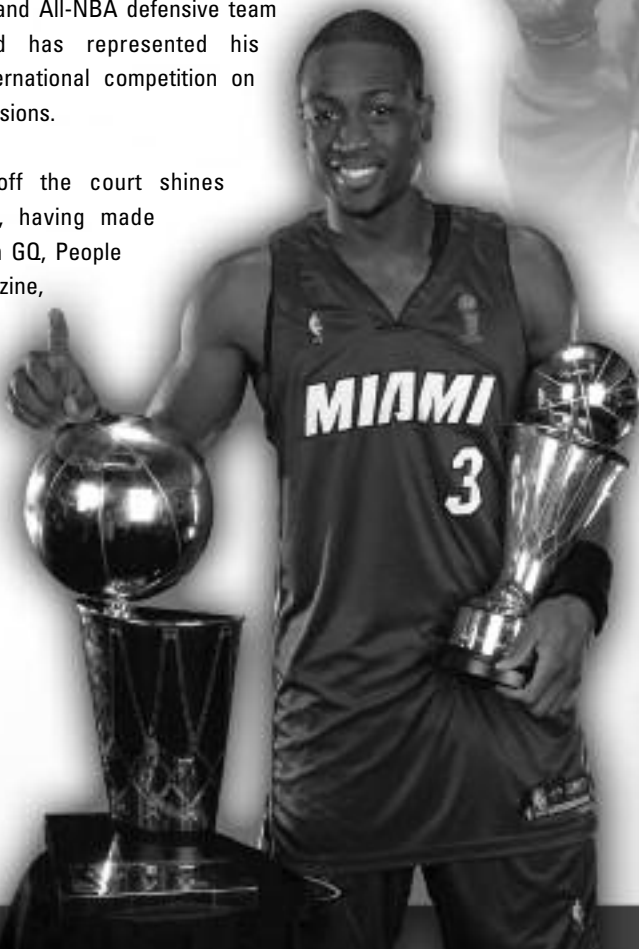
Wade is a three-time All-Star, was a second team All-NBA and All-NBA defensive team selection, and has represented his country in international competition on numerous occasions.

Wade's star off the court shines just as bright, having made appearances in GQ, People and Time Magazine, as well as securing endorsement deals with Converse, Gatorade and Lincoln.

# Family. Professional. Smart. Tough. Unselfish.

Ninth-year head coach Tom Crean would like observers of the Marquette University men's basketball team to think of each of the words listed above when describing the program and players at MU.



The squad's performance during head coach Tom Crean's tenure makes it impossible to argue with any of his selections.

In his eight seasons, Marquette has averaged over 20 wins a year, won a conference championship and made seven postseason appearances, highlighted by the 2003 Final Four, the program's third appearance all-time and first since 1977.

He is a two-time recipient of the Ray Meyer Conference USA, NABC District XI and USBWA District V Coach of the Year awards, and in 2003 won the Coach Clair Bee Award as well as being named a finalist for the Naismith National Coach of the Year Award.

Crean's 65.7 winning percentage and 165 victories place him third in both categories all-time at Marquette.

## National Recognition

Crean's revival of Marquette's storied basketball program has not gone unnoticed by the national pollsters as the Golden Eagles have spent 62 weeks in the rankings since November 2001.

Prior to first appearing during Crean's tenure in the AP Top 25 on November 27, 2001, Marquette had been ranked for just 24 weeks the previous 15 seasons.

Marquette's consecutive year-end rankings in 2002 and 2003 were the first time for the program in a quarter century, and on March 4, 2003, the school earned its highest ranking since 1978 by reaching No. 8 in AP poll, which the team matched in 2006-07.





## Player Development

Personally driven by an intense commitment to improve, Crean has structured a program at Marquette that focuses heavily on individual instruction and has allowed his players to stay ahead of the competition.



In 2005, Travis Diener joined Wade as players under Crean's mentoring who earned All-American and All-Conference honors, as well as going on to be selected in the NBA Draft.

Marquette basketball has been represented on national player of the year balloting in each of the last six seasons.

The development of Golden Eagle players under Crean's tutelage can best be illustrated by the program's representation with international basketball this past summer. Current players Dominic James, Wesley Matthews and Jerel McNeal were all invited to tryouts for USA Basketball to represent the country at the 2007 Pan American Games. Recognized among the top young talent in collegiate basketball, Marquette's trio of selections was the most of any squad in the nation. Teammate David Cubillan was tabbed to the Venezuelan National Team to represent his home country in Olympic qualifying events.

Marquette alumni are scattered across the globe enjoying success in the world of professional basketball; including several current players in the National Basketball Association. Dwayne Wade (Miami), Travis Diener (Indiana) and Steve Novak (Houston) are all featured on NBA rosters, with Wade owning a world championship ring with the Heat.

Through eight seasons, Golden Eagles players have earned 19 All-Conference selections and the program's first conference player of the year award, when Dwyane Wade won Conference USA's top honor in 2003. Wade also went on to become the first Marquette player since 1978 to be named an Associated Press First Team All-America and finalist for the John R. Wooden Award.

The 2007 season saw a pair of Golden Eagles rated among the league's best. Sophomore guard Dominic James was tabbed first team all-league and classmate

Jerel McNeal was named the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year. He also claimed a spot on the all-conference second team.

In 2006, Steve Novak was one of four unanimous selections to the All-Big East first team. Novak was selected 32nd overall by the Houston Rockets in 2006 NBA Draft.

## Fan Support and Television Exposure

Crean's passion and commitment on the court has paid dividends off of it. The program has set total attendance records four times, and since 1999 has drawn nearly two million fans.

Students on the Milwaukee campus have flocked to the Bradley Center in record numbers, making it one of college basketball's best environments. Marquette has finished among the nation's top-25 in average attendance in each of the last six seasons, including a clip of 15,345 per game in 2006-07 to rank 14th overall.

Overall, attendance has increased 70-percent and the top 10 crowds of all-time have occurred during Crean's tenure (all coming since 2002). Marquette's elevated status nationally has made it a favorite of television. Crean's squad has had 87 games televised nationally on network or cable since 2001.

## Career Overview

Crean was named the 15th head coach in Marquette basketball history on March 30, 1999.

Before arriving in Milwaukee, Crean served on the Michigan State basketball staff for four seasons, holding the position of associate head coach for the last two. During that time, the Spartans compiled an 88-41 record and made four consecutive postseason appearances, including a trip to the 1999 Final Four. Michigan State's recruiting coordinator; Crean was instrumental in bringing two-time Big Ten Player of the Year Mateen Cleaves and 2000 John R. Wooden Award finalist Morris Peterson to East Lansing.

Prior to his tenure at Michigan State, Crean spent the 1994-95 season as an assistant coach at Pittsburgh and served as the associate head coach at Western Kentucky from 1990 to 1994. Crean got his start in coaching on the Division I level in 1989-90, serving on Jud Heathcote's staff at Michigan State.

A native of Mount Pleasant, Mich., Crean earned his bachelor's degree in parks and recreation with a minor in psychology from Central Michigan in 1989. While pursuing his degree, Crean coached basketball at Alma College and Mount Pleasant High School.

## 2006-07

Marquette built on its strong run in its first year in the BIG EAST by setting the tone early in the year. The Golden Eagles won the CBE Classic title, defeating Texas Tech and Duke along the way. That started a march to a 24-win season, the third-highest win total in the Crean era.



MU finished BIG EAST play with a 10-6 record, joining only Georgetown and Pittsburgh as BIG EAST teams to win 10 games in the first two seasons of the expanded league. In the end, MU was selected to its second-consecutive NCAA Tournament and the fourth since Crean's arrival.

Eagles season started with promise. The team won 13 of its first 14 games, the best start for the program in 26 years, and defeated Elite Eight participant and rival Wisconsin by nine at the Bradley Center.

Marquette's appearance in the postseason was the fifth during Crean's six seasons, and the school's 38th overall. Early success was highlighted by a season opening championship in the BCA Classic and the team's sixth-consecutive Pepsi Blue & Gold Championship.

## 2003-04

Despite losing Dwyane Wade and Robert Jackson, who accounted for 47.0 percent of Marquette's scoring and 38.0 percent of its rebounding in 2002-03, Crean guided the Golden Eagles to a 19-12 overall record and the quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament. The Golden Eagles postseason appearance was their 37th all-time.

## Year-By-Year at Marquette

Sophomore Dominic James was a first-team All-BIG EAST selection and was named AP All-America Honorable Mention. Sophomore Jerel McNeal was named second-team All-BIG EAST and was the league's defensive player of the year.

## 2005-06

Picked to finish 12th in the BIG EAST Preseason Coaches Poll, Crean guided the Golden Eagles to a fourth place finish in the conference, a first round bye in the conference tournament, and their first trip to the NCAA Tournament since 2003. Marquette posted an overall record of 20-11 and its 20 wins were the most since 2002-03.

The Golden Eagles opened up BIG EAST play with a bang, upsetting then second ranked Connecticut, 94-79, at the Bradley Center. Non-conference play was highlighted by Marquette claiming the Great Alaska Shootout for the second time in Crean's tenure.

## 2004-05

Despite losing All-American point guard Travis Diener for eight games, including the season's final five, Crean guided Marquette to 19 victories and its fourth-consecutive post season appearance. The Golden

The 2003-04 season saw Crean lead Marquette to its 26th-consecutive non-conference home win, a fifth-straight Pepsi Blue & Gold Classic Championship, the program's 1,300th victory all-time (a 65-52 victory at Houston on January 7) and, as a result of a 77-70 victory over Louisville on January 31, only its second victory ever on the road over a Top 5-ranked opponent. After opening the season ranked 23rd in the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today polls, the Golden Eagles spent nine and ten weeks, respectively, ranked in both polls.



## 2002-03

Purely magical is the best way to describe the 2002-03 campaign, as Crean led Marquette to a place it had not been in over 25 years - the Final Four. Marquette's third appearance all-time in college basketball's ultimate destination came as a result of 27 wins (second-most in school history), including a program-best 14 victories in conference, and its first Conference USA regular season championship.

The Golden Eagles finished the regular season ranked No. 9 by the Associated Press, its highest year-end AP ranking since 1978, and No. 6 in the ESPN/USA Today Top 25 poll. MU was one of only 10 teams to be ranked in all 19 of the AP's Top 25 polls and its .818 winning percentage was the program's best since 1977-78.

## 2001-02

In 2001-02, Crean coached Marquette to a 26-7 record and its 22nd NCAA Tournament appearance, but first since 1997. The 26 victories were the third-most all-time and represented the program's first 20-win season since 1997.

The Golden Eagles started the season by winning 10-consecutive games and claiming the 2001 Great Alaska Shootout championship. As a result of its best start in four years, Marquette appeared in the AP Top 25 at No. 23 on November 27, 2001, its first AP ranking since January 19, 1998.

In conference play, Crean's squad won a program-record 12-straight on the way to a school-record 13 conference wins and a number two seed in the C-USA Tournament, the program's highest to-date. A 19-point victory over DePaul on March 1, wrapped up the Golden Eagles first undefeated home season - 16-0 - since 1995-96.

On February 19, MU achieved the school's highest national ranking since February 1979, when it reached No. 9 in the AP Top 25. The Golden Eagles spent a total of 12 weeks ranked nationally and concluded the year ranked No. 12 by the AP and No. 18 by ESPN/USA Today.



## 2000-01

Most preseason polls and publications had Marquette picked no higher than fifth in Conference USA's American Division for the 2000-01 season. As was the case for the previous season, Crean and his club exceeded expectations and recorded their second consecutive 15-14 season.



In contention until the regular season's final day for a top seed at the conference tournament, MU defeated DePaul, Saint Louis and Cincinnati twice, on its way to a 9-7 finish in C-USA, its best since 1997. Marquette's two victories over Cincinnati represented the first time a league member had registered a regular-season sweep of the Bearcats.

## 1999-2000

In his first season as head coach, Tom Crean took a team projected by many in the preseason as sixth in Conference USA's American Division to its first postseason appearance in two years.

Facing a schedule that featured 13 games with teams who participated in the 1998 NCAA Tournament, the 33-year old first-time head coach led his squad to 15 victories overall - including two over Top 25 teams DePaul (No. 21) and Louisville (No. 25) - and an 8-8 conference mark.

# BUCKLEY

## Assistant Coach

The 2007-08 season will mark a return to the Marquette University men's basketball program for assistant coach Tim Buckley. Buckley's first stop in Milwaukee came in 1999-00 when first-year head coach Tom Crean named the Aurora, Ill., native his top assistant. The Golden Eagles posted a 15-14 record that year and were selected to play in the National Invitation Tournament.

In 2006-07, Buckley worked as an assistant coach under Steve Alford at Iowa. He helped guide the Hawkeyes to a 17-14 overall record. Prior to Iowa, Buckley spent six seasons as the head coach at Ball State, where he compiled an overall record of 143-139. The squad posted an 18-12 record in his debut season and captured 23 victories in year two. The Cardinals claimed the Mid-American Conference West Division title in 2001-02 and went on to participate in the NIT. The season was also highlighted by wins over No. 3 Kansas and No. 4 UCLA at the Maui Invitational.

Before joining Crean's staff, Buckley spent five seasons at BSU as an assistant coach before returning as program mentor. The Cardinals posted an overall record of 88-55 during his tenure as an assistant, competing in the 1995 NCAA Tournament and 1998 NIT. BSU won the MAC Tournament in 1994-95 and earned a share of the league title in 1997-98.

Very familiar with the Midwest, his first job in the state came at Wisconsin under Stu Jackson in 1993-94. The Badgers earned their first NCAA Tournament bid since 1947 that season, advancing to the second round and posting an overall record of 18-11.

He began his collegiate coaching career as an assistant at Bemidji State from 1986-88 and moved to Rockford College as an assistant in 1988-89. He was tabbed head coach at Rockford in 1989 and reached 50 victories there faster than any coach in the school's history. He was the youngest coach in the nation during his debut campaign at Rockford and guided the squad to a 16-9 record, the first winning season for the school in seven years. Buckley has served on the Executive Committee for the Mid-American Conference, a regional committee for the NCAA and the Division III NCAA Tournament Committee. He served on the Board of Directors for Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Delaware County while living in Muncie, Ind.

Buckley earned his bachelor's degree in communications in 1986 from Bemidji State and completed his master's work in administration of physical education at the University in 1988. He played two seasons of basketball at Waubonsee (IL) Community College before completing his career at Bemidji State.

# SELTZER

## Assistant Coach

Bennie Seltzer is in his second year on the men's basketball staff at Marquette University. Seltzer spent the previous nine seasons as a member of Kelvin Sampson's staff at Oklahoma.

Joining the Sooners' staff on July 30, 1997, Seltzer was the longest tenured of the OU assistants and his duties included day-to-day operations in the areas of conditioning, scouting, practice, game preparation and film exchange. He tutored Sooner backcourt players and was heavily involved in the program's summer basketball camps.

During his time in Norman, the Sooners averaged 25 wins per season and earned NCAA Tournament berths eight times, reaching the Sweet 16 in 1999, the Final Four in 2002 and the Elite Eight in 2003.

Seltzer, who flourishes in the role of player development, was selected as one of four court coaches for USA Basketball national team trials in July 2004. In that role he was responsible for conducting drills, coaching scrimmages and working with players in East Rutherford, N.J., who vied for spots on the 2004 USA World Championship For Young Men Qualifying Team. The eventual 12-man team later won the gold medal by going 5-0 in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

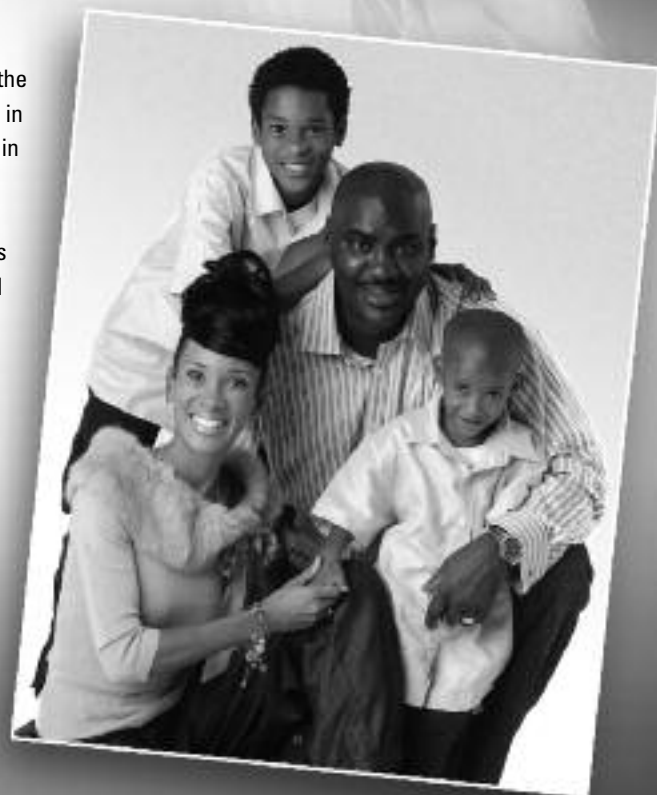
Seltzer's relationship with Coach Sampson started in 1989 when he joined the Washington State basketball team as a freshman. Seltzer starred four years in Pullman, Wash., before spending the next four years playing professionally in Turkey, Venezuela, Poland and Holland.

Seltzer, 35, is the all-time assists leader at Washington State (473) and also ranks third in 3-pointers made (230), sixth in steals (147), sixth in points (1,423) and seventh in minutes played (3,227).

A first-team All-Pac-10 Conference selection his senior season when he averaged 17.9 points and 4.7 assists, Seltzer left as the league's career record holder for 3-point baskets. He was also a member of the Pac-10 All-Freshman Team in 1989-90 when he averaged 11.7 points, 4.1 assists and 1.4 steals per game.

The Birmingham, Ala., native holds a sociology degree from Washington State.

# WILLIAMS

## Assistant Coach

Highly respected recruiter Buzz Williams joined the Marquette University men's basketball staff as an assistant coach in July of 2007.

Williams arrives in Milwaukee after serving for one season as the head coach at the University of New Orleans. He guided the Privateers to a 14-win campaign in 2006-07 and his roster featured Bo McCalebb, the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year. His recruiting class for the upcoming 2007-08 season was ranked in the top 50 nationally by HoopScoop Online.

Prior to UNO, Williams served as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Texas A&M for two seasons (2004-05 - 2005-06) under head coach Billy Gillispie. Both of his recruiting classes with the Aggies were ranked among the best in the nation and featured some of the top-ranked talent at the prep level. The squad made its first NCAA Tournament appearance in 25 years in 2005-06 and the previous team posted the top turnaround in the nation, improving its win total in 2004-05 by 14 games compared to 2003-04.

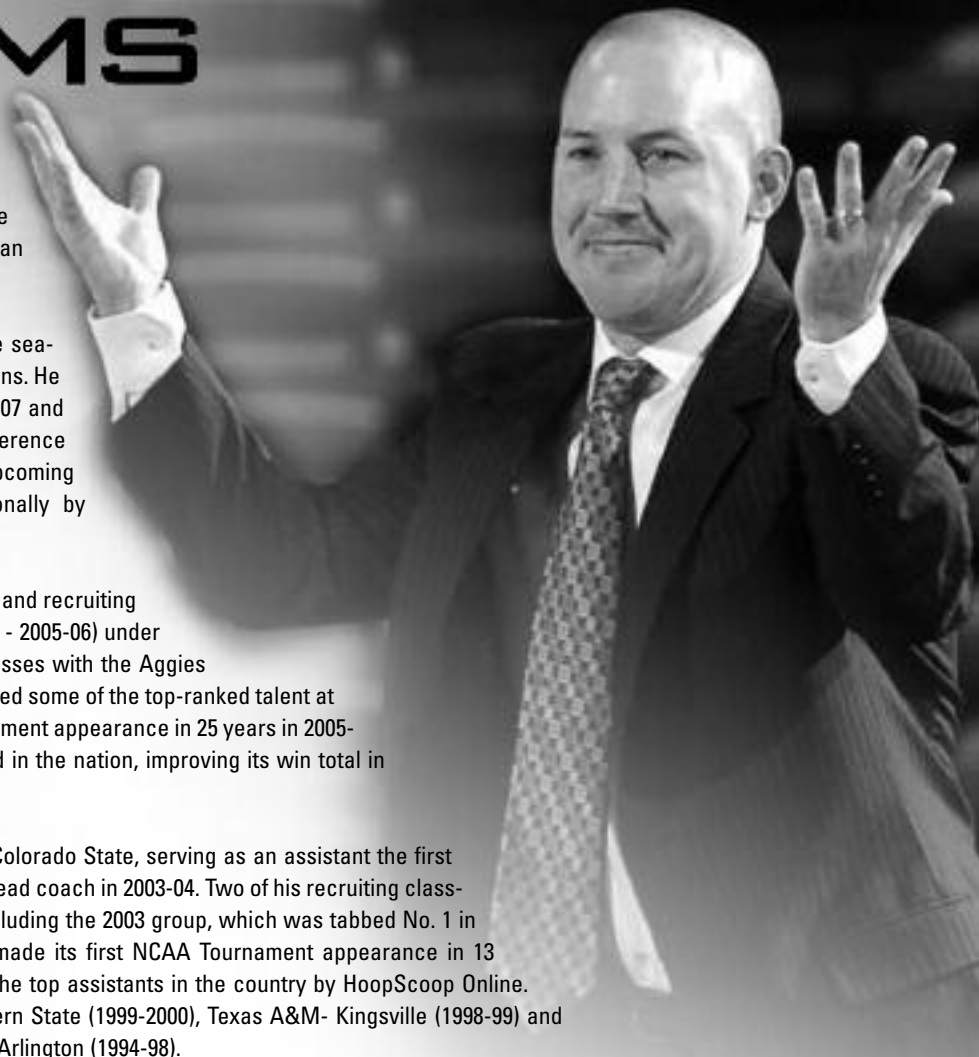
Williams spent four seasons (2000-01 - 2003-04) at Colorado State, serving as an assistant the first three seasons before being promoted to associate head coach in 2003-04. Two of his recruiting classes were ranked among the 40-best in the nation, including the 2003 group, which was tabbed No. 1 in the Western Athletic Conference. Colorado State made its first NCAA Tournament appearance in 13 years during his tenure and he was named one of the top assistants in the country by HoopScoop Online. Williams was previously an assistant at Northwestern State (1999-2000), Texas A&M- Kingsville (1998-99) and Texas-Arlington (1994-98).

Williams signed the highest-rated recruiting class in the history of the Southland Conference while at Northwestern State. The Demons advanced to their first ever NCAA tournament the following season and two of his recruited players were named All-Conference, while one was tabbed Southland Conference Tournament MVP. His accomplishments at Texas A&M-Kingsville include signing the 1998-99 Lone Star Conference Freshman of the Year and a third team All-America guard from Panola Junior College.

At Texas-Arlington, Williams recruited a Southland Conference Freshman of the Year and signed the first Academic All-American in the school's history. Williams was a student assistant coach from 1992-94 at Oklahoma City University where he assisted the team to the 1994 NAIA championship after it advanced to the Sweet 16 the previous season. Williams served as a student assistant from 1990-92 at Navarro College (Corsicana, Texas) where the team won consecutive conference titles while sporting a 45-17 record during his tenure.

The Van Alstyne, Texas, native earned a bachelor's in kinesiology from Oklahoma City University in 1994 before completing his master's work in the same field at Texas A&M-Kingsville in 1999. Williams owns an associate's degree from Navarro, which he completed in 1992.

# RABEDEAUX

Director of Basketball Operations

While the 2007-08 campaign will mark Jason Rabedeaux's fourth year at Marquette, the upcoming season will be his first as director of basketball operations. In each of the three seasons prior, the coaching veteran served as an assistant coach.

Rabedeaux owns 16 years of Division I coaching experience, including three as the head coach at UTEP from 1999-2002. Rabedeaux's contagious enthusiasm and diligent work ethic helped revitalize the UTEP basketball program. In three years under his direction, the Miners posted 46 victories and in 2000-01, just his second season, earned the program's first post season appearance since 1995 with a berth in the NIT. For his efforts, Rabedeaux was named the WAC Coach of the Year by the Sporting News and Houston Chronicle.

Prior to being named the Miners' head coach in September 1999, Rabedeaux spent ten years on Kelvin Sampson's staffs at Washington State (1989-94) and Oklahoma (1994-99). As Sampson's top assistant and recruiting coordinator, he was an integral part of the program's five consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances from 1995 to 1999 and the recruitment of Sooner standouts Eduardo Najera, Aaron McGhee and Hollis Price. Although not a member of that year's staff, Rabedeaux played a big part in recruiting and developing Oklahoma's 2002 Final Four squad.

Before arriving at Washington State, Rabedeaux spent the 1988-89 season as an assistant coach at North Adams State.

As a player, Rabedeaux was a four-year basketball starter at the University of California-Davis from 1984-88 and twice earned All-Conference honors. He concluded his collegiate career as the seventh all-time leading scorer in school history and set records for most three-point field goals made in one season (80), most three-point field goals made in a game (6) and most free throws made in a game (14).

Rabedeaux earned a bachelor's degree in exercise physiology from California-Davis in 1988, and a master's degree in athletic administration from Washington State in 1991.

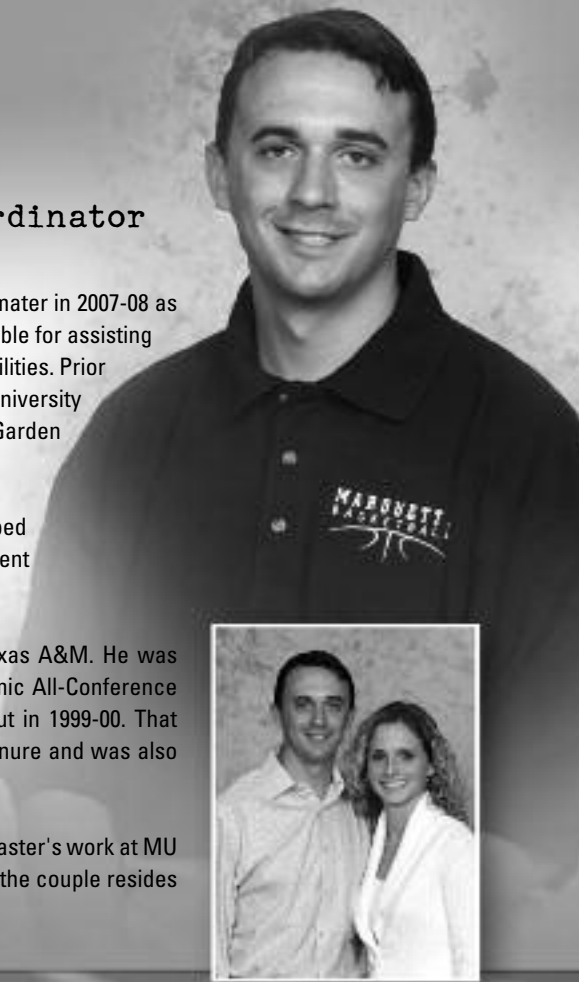
Coordinator of Basketball Operations/Video Coordinator

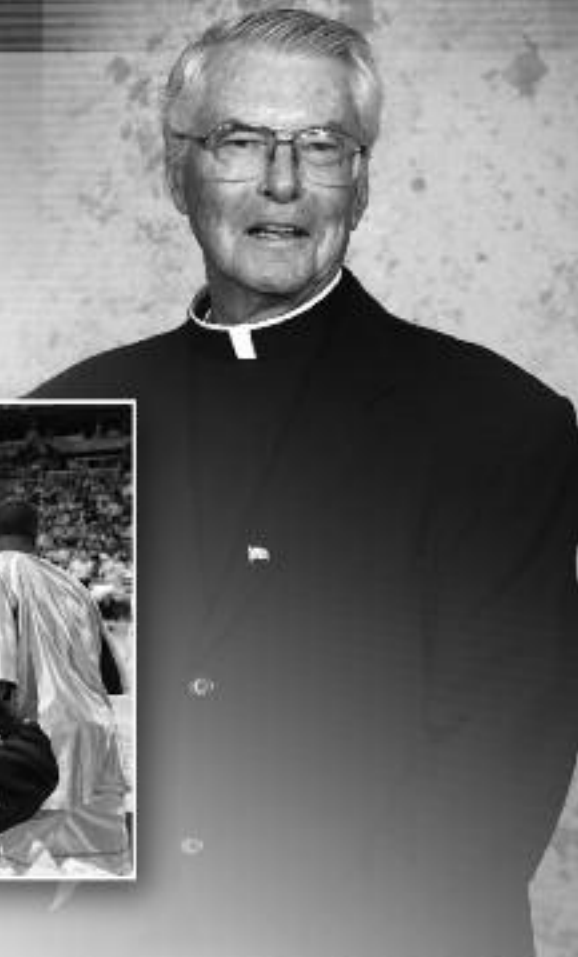
# KELLY, S.J.

## MARQUETTE UNIVERSITY

### MISSION STATEMENT

Marquette University is a Catholic, Jesuit university dedicated to serving God by serving our students and contributing to the advancement of knowledge. Our mission, therefore, is the search for truth, the discovery and sharing of knowledge, the fostering of personal and professional excellence, the promotion of a life of faith, and the development of leadership expressed in service to others. All this we pursue for the greater glory of God and the common benefit of the human community.

### EXCELLENCE

Our students, whether traditional or non-traditional, undergraduate, graduate or professional, come to Marquette University to share our commitment to the pursuit of excellence in all things as a lifelong endeavor. We expect all members of the Marquette community, whatever their faith tradition, to give concrete expression to their beliefs by giving of themselves in service to those in need.



## MARQUETTE PRESIDENT ROBERT A. WILD, S.J.

Robert A. Wild, S.J., is the 22nd president of Marquette University. He began his duties as chief executive on June 17, 1996.

Father Wild is building on Marquette's core strengths: an academically rigorous, values-centered curriculum; solid, practical preparation for work



in a world of increasing complexity and diversity; formation for life of students as ethical and informed leaders in their religious, cultural, professional and civic communities; and graduating women and men

who will dedicate their lives to the service of others.

Under his leadership, the university in 2000 embraced a statement of shared vision for the future:

"Our vision is to provide a Catholic, Jesuit education that is genuinely transformational so that our students graduate not simply better educated but better people, and to do so with such excellence that when asked to name the three or four best Catholic universities in America, people will include Marquette as a matter of course."

Marquette has established clear, measurable goals and specific strategies to achieve this long-term vision. Under Father Wild's leadership, the university has improved academic quality, increased and stabilized enrollment and enhanced partnerships with the City of Milwaukee and community groups. In 2005 Marquette completed the most successful comprehensive campaign in the history of the university raising a total of \$357 million. Marquette is committed to updating academic facilities for

students in the 21st century: a new School of Dentistry opened in 2002, the John P. Raynor, S.J., Library was dedicated in 2003, and the Al McGuire Center, a practice facility for student-athletes, opened in 2004. Father Wild and his Marquette colleagues remain committed to providing students with a Catholic, Jesuit education in an atmosphere of care and faith.

Immediately prior to assuming the Marquette presidency, from 1992 to 1996 Father Wild served as president of the Weston Jesuit School of Theology in Cambridge, Mass., a graduate school which trains clergy and laity for leadership roles in the Catholic Church. From 1985 to 1991 he served as provincial superior of the Chicago Province of the Society of Jesus, directing the activities of Jesuits in northern Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and southwestern Ohio. A biblical scholar and author of two books and numerous scholarly articles, Father Wild taught theology at Marquette from 1975 to 1984. He has been a member of the university's Board of Trustees since 1990.

Father Wild is a native of Chicago. He holds a doctoral degree in New Testament and Christian origins from Harvard University, a master's degree in classical languages, a bachelor's degree in Latin from Loyola

University Chicago, and a licentiate in theology from the Jesuit School of Theology in Chicago. He has held visiting professorships at Loyola University Chicago and the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. Father Wild began his teaching career at St. Xavier High School in Cincinnati, where he taught Latin, Greek and speech and debate from 1964 to 1967. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1957 and was ordained to the priesthood in 1970.

Father Wild is chair of the Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and Universities and a member of the boards of Saint Joseph's University, the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities, the Big East Conference, the Council for Opportunity in Education, the Greater Milwaukee Committee, and the Metropolitan Milwaukee Association of Commerce.



## MARQUETTE LEADERSHIP

### MADELINE WAKE, PH.D.

#### PROVOST

Madeline Musante Wake, Ph.D., is the provost of Marquette University. Reporting to the president, the provost is responsible for academic affairs and institutional planning.

The provost provides intellectual vision and strong leadership for the 10 academic deans and the dean of libraries.

Prior to her appointment as provost in 2002, she was dean of Marquette's College of Nursing for nine years and directed the nursing continuing education program for 14 years. She has been a nursing faculty member since 1977. She has held positions of clinical nurse specialist and hospital nurse administrator.

Wake has consulted on nursing care systems design, continuing education and strategic planning. She has spoken nationally and internationally on nursing and nursing education. She chaired conference committees for national conferences on critical care and the 1986 International Conference on Intensive Care Nursing held in The Hague. She has served as president of the American Diabetes Association — Wisconsin Affiliate, treasurer of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, and chairperson of the Trinity Hospital Board of Directors. She is currently board chairperson of Aurora Visiting Nurse Association and a member of the board of directors for St. Francis Seminary, the Blood Center of Wisconsin, and the

Center for International Health.

Wake has conducted research and has published articles on nursing care delivery systems in U.S. hospitals and on nursing classification. From 1992 to 1999 she was a member of the eight-person core team which developed the International Classification for Nursing Practice. She and three other nurse leaders founded the Wisconsin Nursing Redesign Consortium, a collaborative effort of health care and educational institutions.

Wake was inducted as a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing in 1994. She has received the Outstanding Alumnus Award of Marquette's graduate nursing program, Wisconsin Nursing Association Excellence in Nursing Education Award, Professional Dimensions Sacagawea Award, and the Sigma Theta Tau Distinguished Lecturers Award.

Wake received her diploma from St. Francis Hospital School of Nursing in Hartford, Conn.; her B.S.N. and M.S.N. degrees from Marquette University; and a Ph.D. with a major in urban education and a minor in nursing from the University of Wisconsin — Milwaukee.



### GREG KLIBHAN

#### SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT

Greg Kliebhan is the senior vice president of Marquette University. Reporting to the president, Kliebhan is responsible for top university support functions, which include these divisions: Administration, Finance, General Counsel, Intercollegiate Athletics, Marketing and Communication, Public Affairs, Student Affairs and University Advancement.

Kliebhan has strong Marquette legacy roots and a deep family allegiance. His father, wife Linda, daughters Kelly and Katy, brother, sister and brother-in-law are all alumni.

Kliebhan, himself, is a product of a Marquette education, having earned his undergraduate degree in 1973 from the College of Liberal Arts (now Arts and Sciences). Passion for Marquette and putting students first have characterized Kliebhan's career at Marquette. His personal philoso-

phy reads in part:

"Together, we need to convince all of our staff that their work for students is noble, enriching, and absolutely vital to Marquette University's success — whatever position they might hold and however far from daily contact with students it might be. Marquette University and the work it does with all of its publics is a vocation, not a job... "technical" competence is simply not enough by itself — competence coupled with sincere involvement in this institution is what we should expect and insist on."

Kliebhan and his wife Linda, who graduated from Marquette in 1974 as a physical therapist, bring a similar passion to volunteer activities. As a couple, they served as president of Kelly and Katy's high school parents association at Divine Savior/Holy Angels (DSHA). Greg also was active in the family's parish school, Sts. Cecilia and James School, including serving as coach of the girls' basketball team for eight years. He also coached grade school and high school AAU basketball teams.

In addition to his role as MU's corporate treasurer, Kliebhan has served on the boards of a number of community organizations, including the Bridging the Gap Learning Center and DSHA High School.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS/HEAD COACHES

A member of the Marquette University family for more than a decade, Interim Athletic Director Steve Cottingham has played an intricate role in the development of the Intercollegiate Athletics program at the University.

As Interim Athletic Director, Cottingham oversees Marquette's 14 intercollegiate sports and coaching staffs. ## BIG EAST CONFERENCE

In 2007-08, the BIG EAST will be in its third academic year as a 16-member conference. While many outside the league were curious and sometimes skeptical of the long-term prospects of the largest Division I-A conference, the student-athletes concentrated on their tasks at hand and continued the league's proud tradition of success.

BIG EAST teams earned plenty of recognition at the highest levels in 2006-07. In basketball, the Georgetown men's team and the Rutgers women's team each advanced to their respective Final Fours with Rutgers playing in the national championship game.

The 2006 football season was the BIG EAST's best ever. Louisville, West Virginia and Rutgers all finished in the top 12 in the final national polls. The BIG EAST posted a 5-0 bowl record and won the ESPN Bowl Challenge Cup.

On the diamond, the Louisville baseball team played its way to the College World Series. In softball, DePaul also participated in the College World Series. The Notre Dame women's soccer team advanced to the NCAA title game and the Connecticut field hockey team made it to the Final Four.

The BIG EAST took the men's and women's M.A.C. Hermann Trophy, the top individual award in soccer. The winners were Joseph Lapira and Kerri Hanks, both of Notre Dame.

The goals of the BIG EAST have never changed. The league aims and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A group in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the

league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 124 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 350 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors. Last year in football, Brian Leonard of Rutgers won the Draddy Award, known as the academic Heisman. In addition, Rhema Fuller of Connecticut and Jay Henry of West Virginia were named national scholar-athlete award winners by the National Football Foundation.



Louisville field hockey standout Jessica Javelet, the 2006 BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year, was named first team academic all-America. The Louisville team was recognized by the National Field Hockey Coaches Association for the highest team GPA in the nation for a second straight year.

The BIG EAST has continued its basketball success in the 21st century. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women took home the NCAA crowns. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last nine NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken five of the last eight NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of

athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant in soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.

## BIG EAST CONFERENCE - MICHAEL TRANGHESE

When The BIG EAST Conference announced that it had expanded to 16 members late in 2004, many observers in college athletics were on record saying the new consortium would have to face some daunting challenges in order to make it work. The 2007-08 academic year will be the third with 16 members.

Not surprisingly, Mike Tranghese has guided the BIG EAST through these issues. As a result, the league is stronger than ever.

Tranghese was the BIG EAST's first full time employee and opened the league's doors in 1979, though the doors belonged to a Providence public relations firm. The BIG EAST had only two rooms, an office and a small conference room. Today, Tranghese presides over the nation's largest Division I-A conference. He continues to lead the 16-member BIG EAST on its path of success with his effective leadership and an unwavering commitment to integrity.

The BIG EAST has always been a prominent player in the world of intercollegiate athletics, in large part because of Tranghese's efforts. He believes his job is to create the best possible climates for BIG EAST student-athletes to succeed academically and athletically.

Most recently, the league has secured extremely lucrative television contracts with ESPN, Inc. and CBS that will give BIG EAST schools more exposure than at any point in its history in all sports.

In 2006-07, on the basketball court, the league placed a men's team, Georgetown and a women's team, Rutgers in the Final Four. Football success has never been greater. In 2006, three of the eight BIG EAST squads finished in the top 12 of the national polls.

During his tenure as Commissioner, which began in 1990, Tranghese frequently has been faced with critical membership issues. The league has always emerged in a stronger position. In 2003-04, the BIG EAST addressed a changing national landscape and Tranghese coordinated the entrance of

five institutions for '05-06: the University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

The number of sponsored sports, now at 23, has risen steadily under Tranghese. He was the leader behind the formation of BIG EAST football, which began in 1991. Tranghese, who is acknowledged as an industry leader in television negotiation and production, has been a central figure in every television negotiation in the league's history.

Tranghese's negotiating expertise has resulted in a long-term partnership with Madison Square Garden, host of the BIG EAST Men's Basketball Championship since 1983. The league and the Garden will be partners at least through 2011.

Tranghese has ensured the league's position as a leader in television exposure. The BIG EAST has been a long-time partner with CBS Sports and ESPN and has enjoyed multi-year agreements with both entities in basketball and football. The league's current television contract also includes appearances on ABC.

Tranghese moved into the Commissioner's chair on June 21, 1990 and has been an active leader nationally since his appointment. During the 2002 and '03 football seasons, he was the lead administrator of the Bowl Championship Series, the group of major conferences and bowls that produces a national championship game and the best possible bowl matchups.

In 2000-01, he concluded a five-year term on the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee by serving as chair. Tranghese also has served as chair of the NCAA Men's Basketball Subcommittee on Television. He was on the NCAA's negotiating team that secured a record \$6 billion contract from CBS for broadcast rights to the men's basketball championship.

Shortly after being named Commissioner, Tranghese laid the groundwork and put together The BIG EAST Football Conference. In response to significant conference realignment nationally, he directed an expansion and created a unique eight-team football group. Despite its newborn status, the

BIG EAST was a charter member of the major conference alliance now known as the Bowl Championship Series.

After establishing BIG EAST football, Tranghese guided the league through a critical time that many observers felt could have resulted in a permanent split among its members. In March, 1994, the conference added football members Rutgers University and West Virginia University as its 11th and 12th full-time members and maintained its overall structure.

Just four months later, the University of Notre Dame, clearly the nation's premier men's basketball independent, joined the BIG EAST. Rutgers, West Virginia and Notre Dame began BIG EAST competition in 1995-96.

The league's athletic directors unanimously appointed Tranghese in 1990 after his 11 years of service, the last nine as associate commissioner. As Commissioner, he has led the BIG EAST while maintaining the principles which have marked the conference's explosive rise to prominence -- promoting and cultivating intercollegiate athletic programs in an environment of integrity while pursuing excellence at the highest possible level.

Tranghese's career in college athletics began at American International College in his hometown of Springfield, Mass.

He was the sports information director at Providence College where he generated publicity for the nationally successful Friar teams of the 1970s under Dave Gavitt. As the media attention on Eastern college basketball and the growth of sports events on television increased, Gavitt and Tranghese were prepared to take advantage. Gavitt became the BIG EAST's first Commissioner in 1979 and served until 1990 when Tranghese assumed the helm.

Under Tranghese, the BIG EAST championship slate has expanded from seven men's championships in 1979 to 23 men's and women's championships today.

Tranghese is a 1965 graduate of St. Michael's College in Winooski, Vt. He is married to Susan Huntemann.

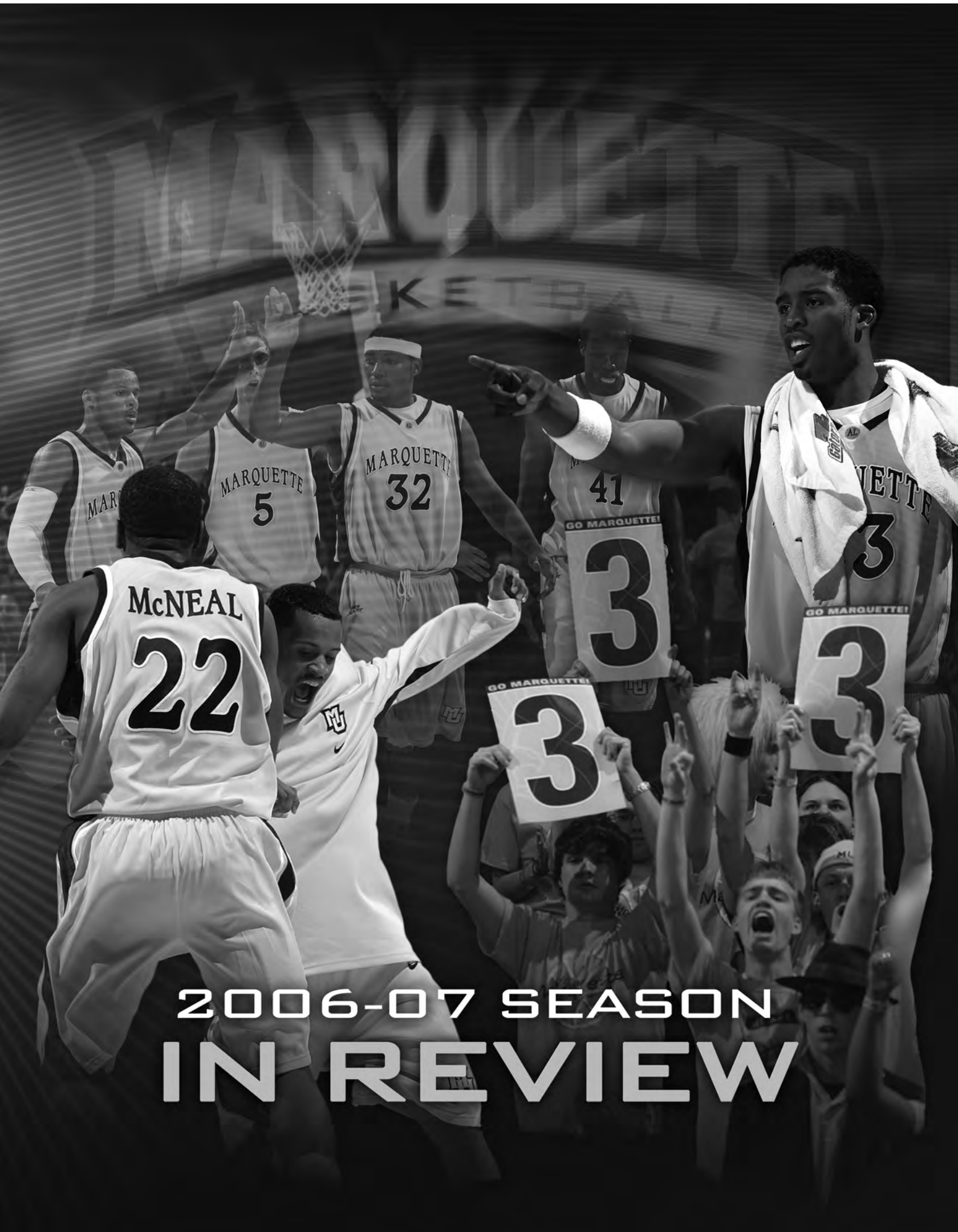

## 2006-07 SEASON IN REVIEW

### **Postseason Play**

Marquette's post season appearance in 2007 was the program's 40th all-time, ninth-most in Division I. It was the school's 25th appearance in the NCAA Tournament. MU's all-time record in NCAA Tourney games stands at 32-26 (55.2). Tom Crean led the Golden Eagles to the post season for the sixth consecutive year, and seventh time in his eight years as head coach. MU participated in a national post season tournament in 12 of the last 14 years.

### **James Named AP All-America Honorable Mention**

Sophomore guard Dominic James was named an Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American.

A member of the BIG EAST All-Conference First Team, James led the Golden Eagles last season, averaging 14.9 points per game. He also led the team and ranked fourth in the conference with 167 assists and was second on the MU squad and fourth in the conference with 64 steals.

James scored 20-plus points in seven games this season and recorded seven or more assists in a game six times. Against Pittsburgh, March 3, he recorded a career-high with 10.

James becomes the first to receive All-American status from the AP since Travis Diener was named to the honorable mention list following the 2004-05 season. He is the 11th student-athlete all time for Marquette to be recognized as an AP All-American.

### **McNeal Earns Praise for Defense**

Sophomore guard Jerel McNeal garnered Rivals.com 2006-07 All-Defensive First Team honors.

McNeal, named the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year and BIG EAST All-Conference Second Team member, led the Golden Eagles and ranked second in the conference with 76 steals this season, the fifth best single-season total in school history. He ranked 10th in the nation, averaging 2.6 steals per game, and was one of only four players in NCAA Division I to average at least 14.5 points, 4.5 rebounds, 3.5 assists and 2.5 steals per game.

Four times this season he grabbed at least six steals in a game, and against North Dakota State, Dec. 2, he recorded a career high seven.

### **James, McNeal Named All-BIG EAST**

Sophomores Dominic James and Jerel McNeal were named to the BIG EAST All-Conference teams, the league announced. James was a first-team selection and McNeal was voted to the second team.

James was Marquette's leading scorer during the regular season at 14.9 points per game and he led the Golden Eagles in assists with 4.9 per game. Both totals were among the league leaders. James was 10th in the BIG EAST in scoring and fourth in the league in assists. He had a career high 10 assists against Pittsburgh in the season finale, improving his league average to 5.4 assists per game. James also ranked fourth in the BIG EAST in steals at 1.94 per game and fifth in assist-to-turnover ratio at 1.97.

McNeal was second on the team in scoring at 14.7 points per game, but was the team leader in scoring in BIG EAST games at 14.9 per game. One of the best defenders in the league, McNeal ranks among the national leaders in steals with 76. He was second in the BIG EAST in steals per game at 2.6.

### **McNeal Named BIG EAST's Best Defender**

Sophomore guard Jerel McNeal was named BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year, the league office announced. McNeal was also named second-team all BIG EAST.

McNeal led the team with 76 steals on the season, the fifth best single season total in Marquette history. McNeal's per game steal total was the second best in the BIG EAST and he ranked 12th on the national steals list. McNeal was the only player in the BIG EAST to average at least 2.0 steals per game and 4.0 rebounds per game.

McNeal is the first guard to win the award since the 2001-02 season, when John Linehan of Providence claimed the award. He is the fifth guard to win the award. McNeal joins a long list of storied players who have been named BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year including Patrick Ewing, Alonzo Mourning, Dikembe Mutombo, Allen Iverson and Emeka Okefor.

### **James Named to USBWA All-District V Team**

Sophomore Dominic James was named to the U.S. Basketball Writers Association All-District V Team. James was one of 10 NCAA Division I student-athletes selected from the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The selections are determined based on voting done by the association's national membership.

James was Marquette's leading scorer at 14.9 points per game and he leads the Golden Eagles in assists with 4.9 per game. Steve Novak received the honor last season. In 2003, Dwyane Wade was named a USBWA First Team All-American.

### **James, McNeal Honored by NABC**

Sophomore guards Dominic James and Jerel McNeal were recognized by the National Association of Basketball Coaches

(NABC) as two of the finest men's collegiate basketball student-athletes in the nation. James was named to the NABC Division I All-District First Team and McNeal was honored on the second team.

The duo joins 40 others from Marquette who have previously been named to an NABC All-District Team. James becomes the first student-athlete since Travis Diener in 2003-04, and 21st overall for MU to make the first team. McNeal is the 17th Golden Eagle to make the second team and follows Steve Novak who made it last season. Marquette has also had four third-team members.

### Marquette Wins 10 BIG EAST Games

Marquette went 10-6 for the second straight season in BIG EAST play. Marquette is one of three teams that has collected 10 wins each of the last two seasons in league play, joining Georgetown and Pittsburgh.

### Pair Moves Up on Three-Point List

Freshman David Cubillan led Marquette in three point shooting this season at 42.5 percent. That total was good enough to move him into fourth on the all-time career list at Marquette.

In his two seasons at Marquette, junior Dan Fitzgerald has made 41.6 percent of his three-point attempts, moving him into fifth place on the Marquette all-time career list.

### 20 Wins in Second-Straight Year

With the win over Providence, Marquette claimed its second-consecutive 20 win season and the fourth in the Tom Crean era. By calendar date, it was the quickest Marquette reached 20 wins (Feb. 6 in 2001-02 with its 20th). MU won its 20th by its 23rd game that season. In all, Marquette has won 20 games or more in 29 seasons. The most wins by a Marquette team during the regular season was 26, set in 1970-71.

### Amongst The Best in Thievery

Sophomore Jerel McNeal was adept at coming up with steals in 2006-07. Twice, he recorded six steals in a game and he had a season-best seven against North Dakota State. With 76 steals on the season, he is 17th in NCAA Division I in total steals, despite missing five games. He led Marquette to a season total of 295 steals, the 18th best total in the nation.

McNeal finished the regular season with 76 steals, the fifth best single-season steals total in MU history.

### In a Class by Himself

Sophomore Jerel McNeal is the consummate all-around player. He was one of three players in country to average at least 14.0 points per game, 4.0 rebounds per game, 3.5 assists per game and 2.6 steals per game. Tony Lee of Robert Morris and Ibrahim Jabber of Pennsylvania are also in this list.

### Crean Locks Up 150

Head coach Tom Crean earned his 150th career win with a defeat of Delaware State on December 5 — all of which have come at Marquette. In his eighth season, Crean joined Bill Chandler (193) and Al McGuire (295) as the only coaches at MU with 150 wins at the school. Crean had 150 wins in 227 career games. McGuire got to 150 wins in 204 career games. Chandler hit the mark in 270 games. Crean coached his 250th career game against Pittsburgh in the BIG EAST Tournament.

### MU Beats Two Top-10 Teams in One Season

With wins over no. 9/8 Duke in the CBE Classic title game and no. 6/6 Pittsburgh, Marquette improved to 8-9 against top 10 teams in the Tom Crean era. It is the second time in as many years and third time in the Tom Crean era that MU has won games against two top 10 teams in the same season.

### Home Court Advantage

Marquette won at least 14 games at home for the seventh straight this year. The Golden Eagles are currently 116-22 (84.1 percent) at home since 2001. Marquette drew 287,872 for its 19 home games in 2006-07 (15,151 average), the seventh straight season that the program has averaged more than 10,000 fans per game. The program has drawn 1.8 million spectators during Tom Crean's eight seasons as head coach, making the Bradley Center one of the nation's toughest venues for opposing teams. Since 2002, Marquette has averaged 14,253 fans, the third best among BIG EAST Schools.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) — Raymar Morgan scored eight of his 14 points during a dominating first half, and ninth-seeded Michigan State clamped down on eighth-seeded Marquette in a 61-49 win in the first round of the East Regional on Thursday night.

"I don't want to just be a defensive team — basketball is a two-way game," Michigan State head coach Tom Izzo said. "Saying that, if you can only be good at one, your chances of moving on are better if it's the defensive end."

Drew Neitzel and Marquise Gray added 12 points apiece for the Spartans (23-11), who shot nearly 54 percent and never trailed in advancing to face the North Carolina-Eastern Kentucky winner in the second round Saturday.

"It's been our mind-set the whole season to win with defense," Neitzel said. "We don't have the most dynamic weapons on the offensive end, so we've had to rely on our team defense the whole season — especially in this game."

The nation's fourth-best scoring defense held Marquette scoreless for almost 10 minutes to start the game and limited the Golden Eagles — coached by Izzo's longtime friend, Tom Crean — to less than 32 percent shooting in one of their worst performances of the season.

Izzo saved a few tricks for his first matchup against his close friend, with most coming on defense.

"We had some new things, but bottom line, they executed their defense game plan really well, and we didn't," Crean said. "It's not easy to chase those screens."

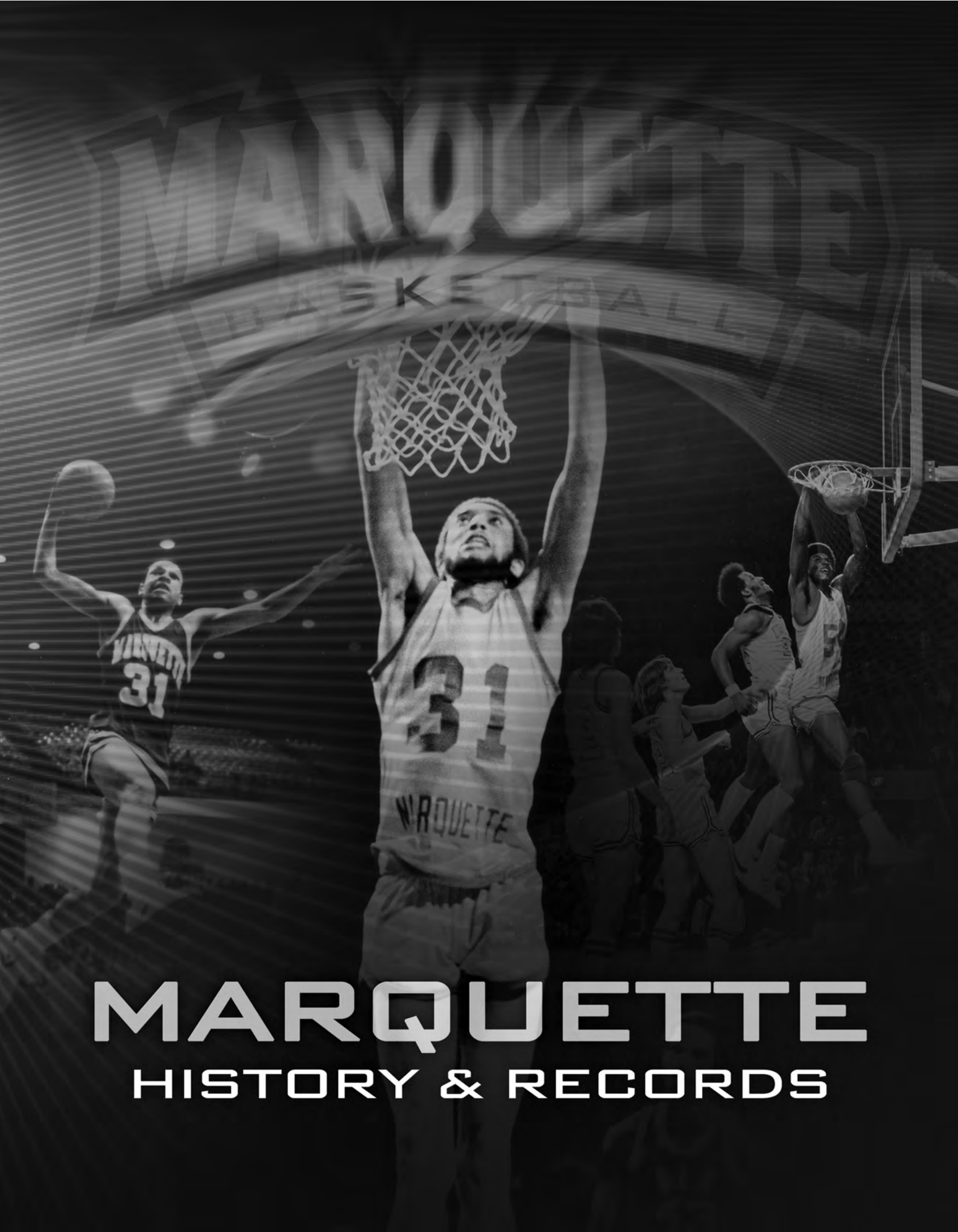

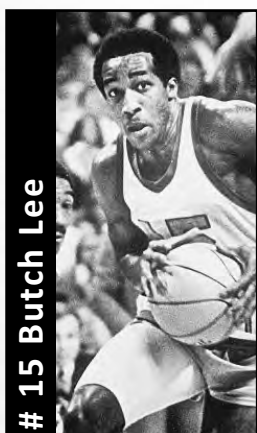
On November 21, 1997, the number 77 was retired in honor of legendary head coach Al McGuire, who led the 1977 team to the NCAA Championship.

The most recent honoree was former All-America performer Dwyane Wade, who saw his jersey raised to the rafters of the Bradley Center on Feb. 3, 2007.

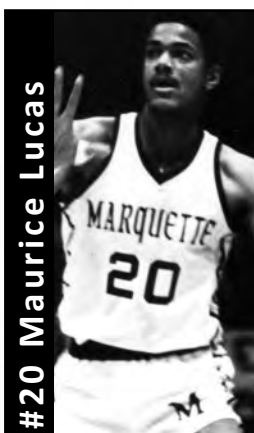

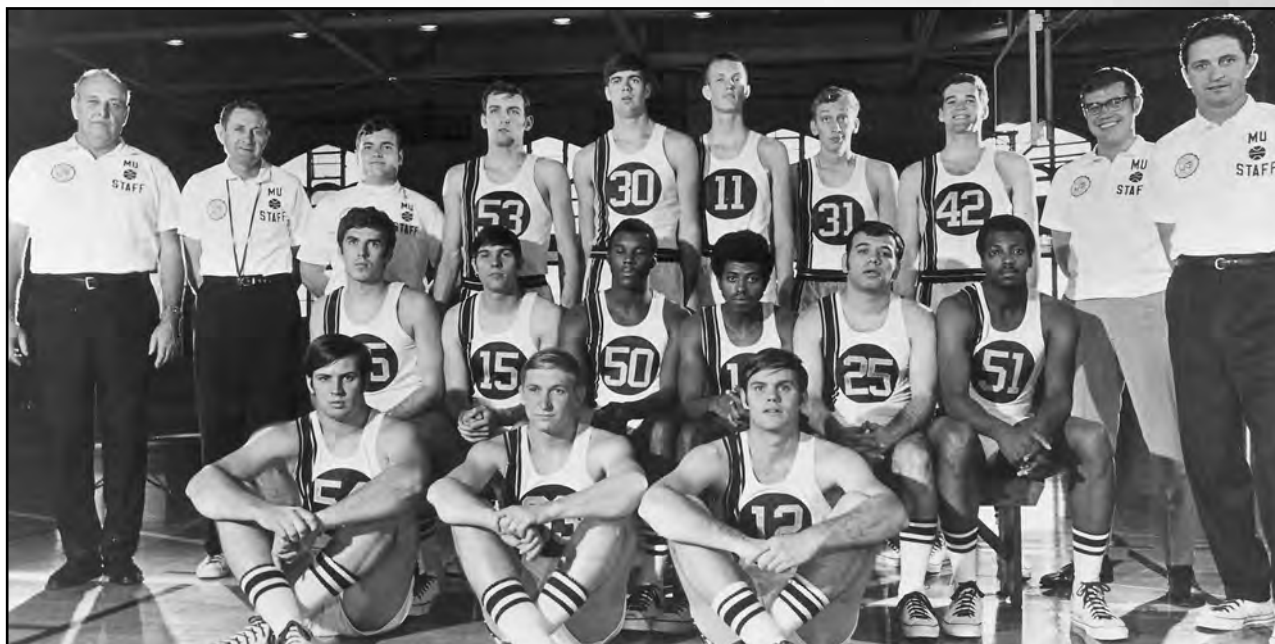

### FROM HEAD COACH AL MCGUIRE:

"I thought we had won the game in the first half, but you have to give Lou (Carnesecca) credit. He keeps coming at you."

On the 1967 NIT championship loss to Southern Illinois: "The only time I thought of that game was at the start of the second half. I was afraid if St. John's scored first, that might be it."

(On Dean Meminger) "There is one way I say you can tell a pro in this game. When they put combination defenses on him - a triangle and two or something like that - he passes off. Unless the All-American passes off, his team is going to get beat."

"It's been a hard week. You get locked up with 12 boys for eight days and you get on each other's nerves. But I was very pleased to meet St. John's in the final and beat them. And frankly, I don't care what other people think about us being here."

"I was real pleased with my seniors. They were fortunate enough to go out champions and they won it themselves."

"Our balance helped a lot. We had four different high scorers in four games and Ric Cobb played a fine tournament. I thought it was a toss-up between him and Dean Meminger for the Most Valuable Player award. Ric has that certain type of thing in pressure situations. I guess it's a tremendous confidence in himself."

"Because of our aggressive defense, it's very difficult to play four games in a week. We played our defense though, and we didn't let everybody shoot right away. I think that was one of the hidden things that won the tournament. We ran Pete Maravich (of LSU) into the ground. We pressured him on offense and kept running on defense."

### FROM ST. JOHN'S COACH LOU CARNESECCA:

(On Marquette) "The best defensive club I have ever played against. They're marvelous. I hate to lose, but my kids didn't quit. Their whole team deserved the MVP award."

### FROM MARQUETTE PLAYER RIC COBB:

"All the time in practice, you hear that voice screaming at you 'get up, get up, play defense, play defense.' You'll do anything to silence that voice."

"I just wanted to win it. I was coming back home and I wanted to win it for the people of New York."

The National Collegiate Athletic Association asked Marquette to dance Tuesday but the invitation was to the wrong ballroom and the Warriors, their feelings wounded, decided they would do their stepping with another partner at Madison Square Garden.

Marquette, expecting a bid in the NCAA Midwest Regional basketball tournament in Dayton, Ohio, was asked instead to leave its home area and play in the Midwest Regional at Fort Worth, Texas.

After five hours and 40 minutes of deliberation, Marquette's athletic board advised the NCAA to find some other independent school to fill the open berth in the Midwest and announced it would accept a bid to the National Invitational Tournament in New York. *Milwaukee Journal*

### FROM MARQUETTE HEAD COACH AL MCGUIRE:

(On two technical fouls) "I would say that I lost the game there. I would say that I gave them two five-point plays and that was it. I had a bad day."

**From Marquette Head Coach Al McGuire:**

(immediately following game) "I think they fell apart in the second half. We hung in there." (How do you feel?) "Emotionally drained. I'm pleased for the guys. It doesn't seem real. Ya know, you think about something like this, but ... I've always been an alley fighter. I don't usually get into the silk lace situations. It seems like it is preordained, but I don't like to use the words of TV announcers, the cliches."

(in the interview room) "We put in the four corners just yesterday in the hour allotted us for practice. We figured to run it and look for the good shot, keeping the big men underneath. For a while, both teams were playing a chess game."

"I was not emotional until a five-second count triggered me. I trigger easily. As a coach, you have to be constantly alert. Right now, I feel washed out."

"Once the avalanche came and we were tied, I tried to stop the avalanche by delays and I called timeouts. Usually we try to do it by contact lens timeouts or something like that. You have to stop the momentum no matter what."

"At the end of the game, I sat there and thought of all the locker rooms, the dirty jocks, the PALS, and the other things that a New Yorker street fighter knows when growing up."

**From Marquette Player Bo Ellis:**

(On McGuire's last game) "It's a super way to go, for him and for us. I'm glad for him, I'm glad for me, I'm glad for the team, I'm glad for the people of Milwaukee and even for those who said we wouldn't get this far."

**From Marquette Player Butch Lee:**

(On what it is like playing for McGuire) "It's not bad for the older guys. They know what to expect. For the freshmen, it gets rough. You have to get some good ear plugs."

**From North Carolina Head Coach Dean Smith:**

"We went into the four corners to get them out of a zone. That's a great zone with 6-9 players - Bo Ellis, Bernard Toone and Jerome Whitehead - in there. (Bruce) Buckley went in for a layup and either Bo or Whitehead blocked it. Then they went into their delay game. They hit all of their free throws down the stretch. Of course, that is what we did to get here."

**From North Carolina Player Phil Ford:**

"I don't want anybody to quote me as saying that my elbow affected my play out there or cost us the game. But, I feel that I have been useless to the team for the last two games. Anytime that you play for the national championship, that should give you enough to win."

**From North Carolina Player Mike O'Koren:**

"I knew that we were going to come back, but I didn't expect it to be that quick. And I knew that once we got the lead, we would go into the four corners and get them to chase us. But Marquette played the four corners smart. They laid back and didn't foul us."

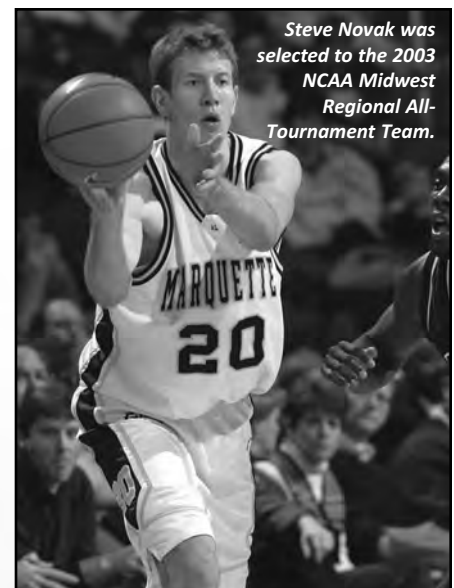

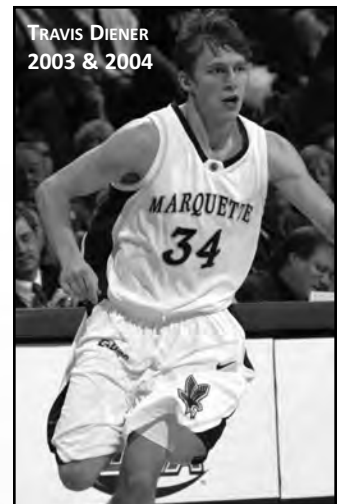
## PEPSI BLUE & GOLD CLASSIC

In 2002, Marquette Athletics announced Pepsi as the title sponsor of the school's regular season men's basketball tournament, the Blue & Gold Classic. Pepsi's commitment has allowed the Department of Athletics to continue operating the nation's third-longest in-season men's basketball tournament.

As part of the multi-year sponsorship agreement, Pepsi makes an annual contribution to the University's Blue & Gold Fund. The Blue & Gold Fund provides scholarship support for student-athletes who compete on Marquette's 14 athletic programs.

Now in its 46th year, the Pepsi Blue & Gold Classic has been seen by over 800,000 basketball fans. In 1995, a single-night classic record 17,405 fans watched Marquette defeat Columbia, and UW-Green Bay upset Texas A&M. Overall, a two-night record crowd of 32,474 attended the 1995 Pepsi Blue & Gold Classic.

The Golden Eagles have won the classic 29 times, including the last six of eight. College basketball greats such as Florida State's Dave Cowens, LSU's Pete Maravich, and UCLA's Gail Goodrich have participated in the classic. Marquette players have dominated the tournament's Outstanding Player honor, with Bo Ellis, Travis Diener, Butch Lee, Dean Meminger, Glenn "Doc" Rivers, George Thompson and Dwyane Wade all having won the award.

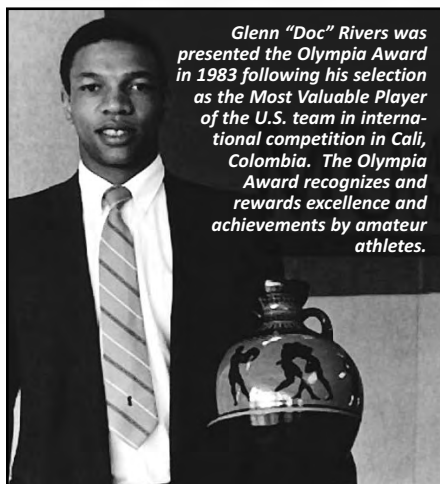

## Robert L. and William P. McCahill Award

The Robert L. and William P. McCahill Award is presented annually to the Marquette senior athlete from the previous year who has demonstrated the highest performance in scholarship, leadership and athletics. It is awarded by the William J. McCahill, Sr., family in honor of Marine Captain Robert L. McCahill, a former standout Marquette football player who earned the bronze star and gave his life for his country on Iwo Jima during World War II and his brother, the late Marine Colonel William P. McCahill., who starred on the MU track & field team, was a noted historian and author of three books, and served as the Executive Director of the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped for 27 years.

## MARQUETTE MEDIA RELATIONS

**Credentials:** Working media in need of credentials for Marquette home games should contact the Athletics Media Relations Office. Credential requests must be received at least 24 hours in advance of the game, and may be made via fax (414.288.6519) or email (scott.kuykendall@marquette.edu).

Credentials will be held at the Media Entrance (Arena Control at the Bradley Center) for pick up on the day of the game approximately two hours prior to tip-off.

Credentials are for WORKING MEDIA ONLY and will be allocated with the appropriate work space in the media seating areas according to the following priority:

1. Originating radio and television outlets;
2. Daily newspapers providing regular coverage of Marquette and its opponent;
3. National news agencies servicing the print and electronic media;
4. Radio and television outlets providing regular coverage of Marquette and its opponent;
5. National or regional print and electronic media;
6. Officially-sanctioned student media, specialty publications and broadcast publications of Marquette and its opponents;
7. Other types of print and electronic media.

**Parking:** Parking is not available to home and visiting members of the media. There are several parking structures available within walking distance of the Bradley Center.

**Photographers:** Photographers are limited to working in the designated areas at each baseline, unless other arrangements have been made with the Athletics Media Relations Office.

**Radio & TV:** All requests for broadcasting a Marquette game from the Bradley Center must be made through Scott Kuykendall, Assistant Athletic Director. Two analog and one ISDN line are available on a courtesy basis for visiting radio.

**Postgame:** Per BIG EAST Conference policy, the head coaches for both teams will be made available to the media in the interview room. The order of appearance will be determined by postgame radio/television commitments of the coaches.

The Marquette locker room is closed to all members of the media. Marquette players that are requested by the media will be brought to the interview room. The Bradley Center press room is located in the west corridor on the floor level of the arena.

non-sports events, such as concerts, ice shows, family entertainment and even motor sports events.

Bradley Center patrons won't miss a moment of action with the Center's use of state-of-the art video technology. In September, 1995, the Bradley Center unveiled a new Sony Jumbo Tron large screen video display system. The four-sided Jumbo Tron is the largest center-hung system in North America. Supplementing the scoreboard are two 14-foot by 10-foot videowalls that are used during events for replays and split-screen action. In addition, there are over 120 video monitors located throughout the center.

The Bradley Center Video Suite/Press Box, located on the west side of the Suite Concourse, contains the production facilities for the Center's video and audio systems. The video system receives signals from multiple, high-resolution CCD cameras placed in various locations in the Center. The Bradley Center sound system is capable of delivering 100 decibels to all areas of the arena. It features distributed speaker clusters suspended 85 feet over the seating area and floor.

#### Chicago / Points South:

Take I-94 north to I-43 north; travel north on I-43 to the Civic Center / Kilbourn Avenue tunnel exit (Exit #72-C). At the first traffic light, turn left onto 6th Street; travel 2 blocks. BC Parking Structure is located to your right.

#### Green Bay / Points North:

Take I-43 south to the 4th and Broadway exit (Exit #73-A); follow left lane to 4th Street / Civic Center exit; exit curves down to the right; turn right at the traffic light (Juneau Avenue) to 5th Street; turn left on 5th which curves into Highland. Entrance to the BC Parking Structure is located to your left.

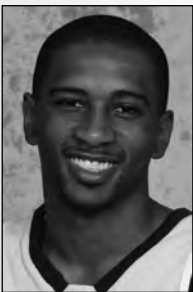

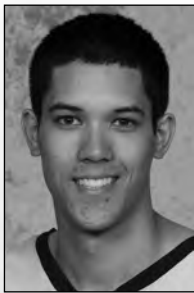
